From The Principal

Hello Neighbour!

Although the spring season officially begins this weekend, Winnipeggers have a more pragmatic view of spring: we need the snow to go in order to declare an end to winter, and even then we are not entirely convinced, having been fooled before by April blizzards. As the snow begins to melt, we start to look for the harbingers of spring, from pussy willows to robins to preseason baseball. Although I take heart at the natural signs of the impending season, one of the main indicators of spring for me is the re-emergence of neighbours.

All winter long we shuttle between our vehicles and houses with as much speed as possible. If by chance we see the people who live around us through our scarves, toques and parkas, we acknowledge them with a curt nod or quick hello. Once the frigid weather passes and we are able to move around the yard again, we find the time to catch up, chatting over the fence or meeting people as they walk their dogs. A feeling of community and con-



nection flourishes along with the crocuses. It is almost like a spiritual thaw takes place alongside the physical one, and it allows us to extend ourselves out to our physical neighbours and to the world beyond.

This year our Lenten theme is, *Who is my Neighbour?* The question comes from the introduction to the parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke's Gospel. A person who had training in the law asks Jesus how he can achieve eternal life. Jesus, sensing that the man already knows the answer, asks him what the law says. The answer comes, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength and with all your mind, and love your neighbour as you love yourself." The man pushes further, asking Jesus, "Who is my neighbour?" Jesus' answer comes in the form of the famous parable of the man hurt on the roadside. Many people pass by, but no one comes to his aid, except for the proverbial Samaritan. It is important to note that the Jewish people of the time did not regard Samaritans as friends. In normal circumstances Jews and Samaritans would not have spoken to each other; in extraordinary circumstances, the person that the injured man would have despised saves his life.

In his parable, Jesus chooses to have the injured Jew rescued by a Samaritan to illustrate his point more clearly. It is our actions, rather than our proximity or similarity to others that make us "neighbours". The global nature of our society and lightening speed of media allows us instant access to the suffering of people from Syria, Sudan, Korea, and Afghanistan. These international neighbours need our support along with our neighbours at the Bravestone Centre and the senior whose snow you shovel. It is our compassion, caring and kindness that makes us neighbours with the people on our street, in our city and country and around the world. It's not always easy being a good neighbour in our world, but we all know how right it feels and how thankful we are when someone is a good neighbour to us!

As the coming season of spring warms the earth and brings it to life again, may the message of this parable enlighten us on our Lenten journey and enliven us to live as true neighbours in our communities and in our world.

de la class française

1 année – 2 année

At the beginning of each class, students participate in calendar based routine activities through song, which aid in identifying the days of the week, months of the year, and numbers in French. For the second term students have been learning vocabulary related to the classroom, weather, temperature, colours and the voyageurs.

3 année – 4 année

During the second term, students have been extending their knowledge of the "calendrier" and focused daily on vocabulary related to weather, temperature and graphs. They have also been studying new vocabulary through themes such as: Mon salle de classe, La nourriture, and Les voyageurs.

5 année - 6 année

In grade 5 and 6 this term the students were focusing on the masculine and feminine "le et la" in French class. They expanded their number vocabulary and conjugated the verb vouloir to help write their new year's resolutions. They explored the vocabulary of "Les voyageurs" through classroom activities, went to the festival du voyageur, and ended with presentations to practice their oral communication skills.

7 année à 8 année

The grade 7 and 8 students continue working towards recognizing masculine, feminine, and plural words using "le, la, and les", and identifying pronouns "je, tu, il, elle, nous, vous, ils, elles". They are becoming more familiar with the conjugation of "er" verbs when writing and communicating, and are progressing really well with grammar and sentence structure when writing. Using various reading strategies has also helping the grade 8's build up their reading comprehension and confidence. Excellent job in term 2!

Field trips and Presentations

The grade 5 and 6 students recently visited the festival du voyageur and had an amazing time. It was a little muddy since the temperature was above zero, but the students had fun none the less. They certainly enjoyed the maple taffy and beaver tail pas-

tries, built mini canoes, and learned more about the voyageur way of life. The students played outdoor games and had the opportunity to purchase some voyageur memorabilia as well. It was a fabulous cultural learning experience!

On March 20th grades 7-8 and 3-4 had the opportunity to cook with our French presenter Christoph from "Fun en frainçais". Students began working with "la nourriture" vocabulary to prepare for their cooking experience and were very excited to put what they learned to good use. What a treat it was for them to learn, cook and eat all at the same time! Mmmmmm...



Nursery News

We have had a busy but wonderful time in Nursery. They have been working on the alphabet letters in their scrapbooks and have almost completed the letters of the alphabet. The Little Ones have worked hard on learning how to hold a pencil and write their name. We have practiced our scissor skills (yes, it is a skill) and have cut paper, straws and even some of our beaded necklaces in our dress-up area.

They have explored several authors during our 'I Love to Read' month and have had guest readers come in to share their favourite stories. They are learning how to speak in front of the classroom with our 'Show and Tell' program and when it is their turn to be the Special Helper, they give the morning report of how many friends are at school, the weather report and the day's date.

During our 'Morning Meeting' we have learned to listen when someone is speaking, put their hand up when they want to talk and sit criss-cross, applesauce with their hands on their laps. They are able to form a line to walk down the hallway and remember to be quiet so we do not disturb other classrooms.

The Little Ones are learning how to be more independent by getting dressed and undressed by themselves, being responsible for their home folders and putting their shoes in their lockers at the end of the day. They are also learning to clean up after themselves when choice time is over and after snack time. They have also been very conscientious about our recycling program in our classroom.

We are hearing please and thank you when asking for something and sorry if they have hurt someone. They are learning to play and work with others and how to take turns with toys. We sing and dance nearly every day and sometimes just take some time to be silly.

What progress they have made since September and we can't wait to see how much further they will go.

Ukrainian Club

We are learning to write, speak, and read some simple phrases and numbers that are often used on a daily basis. The classes are held on Tuesdays. Dates for Ukrainian Club will be indicated on the school calendar. There may be cancel-



lations due to meetings, school events or if I am away from school. Whenever possible, parents will be given prior notice about schedule changes. The final class will be held at the mid May. There are some minor fees for the course to off set the cost of teaching materials and supplies. Information was sent home with participating students.
















The Easter Vigil ... You want to be there!


I look forward to celebrating with you and your family at the Easter Vigil this year. The Vigil will begin at 9 pm on Saturday, April 15th.
