

From The Principal

Running Lessons

I never liked running as a kid, as a rule I made a point of avoiding all occasions of sweat. My conversion to the active life came through the prompting of my then seven year old. He really wanted to be like his dad, who was running a half marathon. Being a nervous mom, I couldn't let him do the Super Run by himself, so the choice was made. Soon our younger son wanted to join in and on we ran. Over the years we went in many different fun runs including Santa Shuffles, Hallowe'en Howls and Marathon Relays. We even ventured into a PEI Potato Blossom Run. Although my children have grown and gone on to other pursuits, I have stuck with running. Strangely, despite my protestations as a youth, it suits me. I have logged a fair number of miles over the years and learned a lot about myself in the process. Much of what I believe to be true about running has parallels to others areas of my life.

You need to find your own pace; trying to run at the wrong speed will exhaust your energies and leave you discouraged. I long ago resigned myself to the fact that in a world of thoroughbreds, I am a bit of a Clydesdale. I am not the fastest runner, nor will I ever be. If I were to dwell on the Lycra clad speedsters who leave me in their dust, I might be inclined to give up running for good. Focusing on what I can do, both in running and in my work allows me the grace to do something, and to do it to the best of my abilities.

Rather than comparing and despairing, setting goals for yourself and extending those limits builds a positive self-image and is integral to self improvement. My first goal was that Super Run and as lame as it might seem, I felt proud that I actually did it. The next goal was a relay leg and then a `10 K, followed by a half-marathon. Moving towards goals in our family, work or spiritual life can have the same effect, giving us a sense of purpose and satisfaction.

Often when I head out to run, I am alone and this solitude can be a gift. All of us need time alone to collect our thoughts, reflect and pray, whether we do this while running, sitting under a tree or kneeling in a church It he. Conversely, it is equally true that I benefit from running with friends. Working towards a common goal and receiving support through difficult patches has allowed me to accomplish more than I could have done alone, both on the trail and in life. We live in a bit of a tension between solitude and companionship; I think that it is about balancing time for both.

Running involves work and there is likely to be pain involved. As in other areas of life- parenting, marriage, careers-the rewards of the work are worth the effort involved. Sometimes it is even fun, cue the endorphins! The real trick is persevering through difficult times and having faith that things will improve if you continue to try, even walking for a bit if necessary. Still, most runners I know have experienced some type of damage, from simple strains to side -lining injuries. The truth is that none of us are exempt from the difficulties and struggles life brings. Discerning when to push through the hurts and when to take time to heal is an important skill in running and in life.

Running isn't everyone's thing, God knows I never expected it to be mine, but if I have managed to jog some reflection on life, then I have made it to this finish line. I hope that the summer provides you time to live at a more relaxed pace, with time for solitude and companionship, work and play, recuperation and recreation. Before we know it, we'll be off and running with a new school year.

Annual Community Report 2015-2016

Each school in the province must provide an annual school report for the community. The purpose of the report is to share some school profile information, report on various steps taken to meet school improvement goals and to outline other action plans underway in the school. Please take some time to review this report. Should you have any questions or comments regarding any information therein, or if you would like to have input regarding plans for the coming year, please contact the principal or one of the School Board members. You are also welcome to share your ideas at the school board meeting on Monday, September 12th or at the PALS meeting on Tuesday, September 13th. Your ideas are welcome and play an important role in shaping the school's direction and future.

School Profile

St. Alphonsus School is a K-8 Catholic School. This year, the student population was 220, and the staff consisted of fourteen certified teachers, five instructional aides, an office manager, a financial administrator, a building manager and a custodian. As well as providing the provincial core curriculum, the school offers religious instruction, basic French instruction (grade 1-8) and resource support.

School Plan 2015-2016

One of the tasks of the school administration is to develop a plan in consultation with the various members of the community, including staff, students and parents. Many of the initiatives pursued by schools require a long term approach for implementation. As a result, most school plans encompass more than one school year. This practice has been the case in our school. After priorities were identified, strategies were developed in alignment with our goals. The plan was formalized and put into effect. Our staff has found that choosing one of the goals as our primary focus for each of the three years of the school plan allows us to move more deeply into the goal. This year our focus was Art Education.

Art Education: To enhance the visual arts program.

Over the course of this year it has been interesting to see the wide variety of visual arts that the students have been involved with. Puppets, paintings, photography, collage, clay and dough sculpture, plasticine pictures, pastels, charcoal and papier maché are just a few of the different projects that have happened at different grade levels.

Art education was the main focus of our school plan for this school year. We allotted in-service time to provide professional development for the teachers. This time was well spent; teachers had hands-on instruction from local artist and teacher, Alice Kulyk. The result of this work was even greater diversity of art experiences for our students.

Numerical Comprehension: To develop students' ability to think creatively and persist when solving mathematical problems.

The area of numerical comprehension has been a focus at the school for a number of years, as members of the teaching staff are keenly aware of the importance of these foundational skills for students' future success. This year, teachers have spent time in direct teaching of problem solving including modeling the thought process needed to solve problems. Teachers have attended in-services and brought the information back to our staff meetings. As well, in the summer of 2016 many of our teachers are attending an intensive workshop on strategies for supporting and developing mathematical thinking. This professional development will allow teachers to gain additional understanding of how to differentiate programming for all students and address any deficit

areas in student learning. This area will be apriority focus for the upcoming school year.

Science/Inquiry: To increase students' scientific literacy by fostering their understanding of and engagement in scientific inquiry, technological problem solving and decision making.

This was our target priority over the 2014-15 school year. Over the course of this school year we have seen continued growth in the implementation of inquiry based learning throughout the school. We anticipate building on the momentum created in this area over the past two school years as we move forward.

Nursery School

This year was the inaugural year for our nursery program. The concept of a nursery program had been bandied about for a few years. We were lucky to secure an excellent, certified teacher to head up the program, as well as a dedicated assistant. The program blossomed under their care and attention. We are looking forward to a second successful year of nursery beginning in the fall.

Sustainability Education

Sustainability was an emerging topic of discussion this year. The staff talked about ways in which we can educate students to become better stewards of our planet, as well as ways in which the school community can model this stewardship through the decisions we make. In the upcoming year, the staff will develop a sustainable School plan with guidance from personnel at Manitoba Education.

In Summary

It has been a busy year at the school, with much growth and change. We are working towards our priorities while remaining responsive to the emerging needs of the students and the community. Thank you to all members of the community-students, staff and parents—for your ongoing support of the school. Together we make St. Alphonsus School a great place to be.

As is always the case, the spring term has sped by!


April

First of all, we have brought in food items before each and every school mass and have collected at various intervals to send to Winnipeg Harvest. We estimate that over the course of the year, you were able to raise over 800 lbs of food to those in need. Secondly, we drew in toys to wrap for the inner city mission called "Welcome Home". This event caused much jolly buzz and happiness over hot chocolate and hospitality! To imagine the bright faces on Christmas morning unwrapping the toys we offered!

Third of all, we ran a Development and Peace campaign. We tried to bring awareness to climate change issues and the students participated in a workshop offered to help us know how to reduce our impact on the globe. Here are some delicious snacks for you and your family to enjoy this summer.

Cinnamon Pita Chips

Ingredients:

5 teaspoons butter, softened

5 teaspoons sugar

5 teaspoons cinnamon

5 whole wheat tortillas

Instructions:

Place tortilla on a flat surface. Using a plastic knife, spread 1 teaspoon of butter over the entire tortilla.

- Sprinkle with 1 teaspoon of cinnamon and 1 teaspoon of sugar.
- Cut tortilla into bite sized pieces.
- Carefully place pieces onto a parchment lined cookie sheet.
- Bake at 350° for 10 minutes or until golden.

Fruit Salsa

Ingredients:

1 orange, peeled, chopped into tiny pieces

1 apple, chopped into tiny pieces

5 strawberries, chopped into tiny pieces

1 kiwi, peeled, chopped into tiny pieces

¾ cup grapes, chopped into tiny pieces

½ lime, squeezed

Instructions:

Chop all the fruit into tiny bite sized pieces the size of your fingernail.

Place all ingredients into a bowl and squeeze $\frac{1}{2}$ a lime over the fruit.

Mix together and enjoy!

This can be refrigerated for up to 3 days.

Uniform Policy Reminders

A letter went home earlier in June advising parents about some uniform policy issues. Here are a few reminders of particular concerns that we ask you to be mindful of:

- Non-school hoodies are not allowed.
- Footless tights or leggings may not be worn underneath skorts, shorts or tunics.
- All items must be in good repair, without rips, tears or stains
- Students may wear an undershirt under their uniform shirt, but is must be white with no
- printing on it.
- Shorts, skorts and tunics must be knee length. Girls wearing tunics should wear a modesty short underneath for their comfort when playing outdoors and in the gym.
- Pants must be standard dress pants styling, with no additional pockets. Denim, jersey knit and jegging type pants that are tight fitting are not acceptable.
- · Tights and socks can be any colour.


