### From The Principal

We are entering into the season of parcels, packages and presents with surprises and secrets inside. The anticipation will build over this Advent season until we arrive at Christmas morning. You may be a mall shopper, an Amazon warrior, or perhaps even a crafty Kris Kringle, but it is hard not to get caught up in this side of the Christmas season. Regardless of whether presents are under the Christmas tree or parcels are arriving on the front doorstep, there is excitement and speculation about what the boxes contain. Gift giving and receiving make us feel special, representing a tangible acknowledgement of the valuable gifts we are to each other.

Here are a few things I try to bear in mind as I give and receive, both literally and figuratively:

# School Plan 2018-2019

One of the tasks of the school administration is to develop a plan in consultation with the various members of the community, including staff, students and parents. Many of the initiatives pursued by schools require a long term approach for implementation. As a result, most school plans encompass more than one school year. This practice has been the case in our school; these goals will continue forward into subsequent school years.

#### **Goal 1**- English Language Arts

ELA Curriculum Implementation: To engage teachers and support staff in dialogue regarding the new provincial ELA curriculum.

- Staff will be involved in professional development across all grade levels.
- Priorities meetings throughout the year will focus on different aspects of the new curriculum.

### **Goal 2-Sustainability**

Education for Sustainable Development (ESD): To assist students in becoming informed and responsible decision-makers, who actively contribute to the social, environmental and economic wellbeing of all people.

- Staff will use professional development time to continue the process of developing a school plan specific to education for sustainable development
- The ESD grant, secured over the 2017-18 school year, will be used to implement a new composting strategy.
- Teachers will share and discuss ESD activities that take place at their grade level.
- A student group for sustainable practice will be initiated.



### **Goal 3- Assessment and Reporting**


Revision of School Report Cards, Authentic Assessment Practices: The teaching staff has reflected on our reporting process and determined that we wanted to revamp our school report card to better reflect our practice, as well as important trends in provincial education. A staff sub-committee developed a draft report, which was fine-tuned and then shared with parents. It will be implemented in the first reporting period. Any parent feedback on the document will be reviewed to ascertain if further adjustments need to be made.

The conversations around reporting practices in turn sparked discussion about assessment best practices. There was interest in pursuing this area further as part of our ongoing professional learning.

#### **Goal 4- Inclusion**

Inclusion of All Learners: To ensure that students of all ability levels have learning experiences that are engaging, providing appropriate challenge to each individual.

- Over the last few years, professional development has focused on broadening the scope of lessons, allowing for greater differentiation across all subject areas.
- The resource teacher continues to plan collaboratively with classroom teachers on a regular basis and will consult with teachers and resource staff to determine progress towards the goals that are set for individuals and groups.
- As an offshoot of Goal 3 above, the staff will look at how the reporting process is applied for students with a student specific or individualized plan. If any changes to the process are needed, we will follow a similar process as for the main report cards and look to implement an improved report in the fall of 2019.

#### Kindergarten

The kindergarten students have had a great first term in music. They are an enthusiastic group that loves to sing, move, and engage in learning activities. The term began with songs of welcome as well as call-and-response songs (songs that require an echo response or a sung answer). These songs are introduced to cultivate a feeling of belonging and comfort in the music room and also to help students activate their singing voices. Songs that involve movement are added to further develop those initial elements while helping students to feel the beat in music and to develop a comfort level with controlled movement. Next I introduced a series of instructional songs. These simple songs will be used throughout the year and into grades one and two to teach a host of music cal concepts from beat and rhythm to harmony and transposition. In the first term of kindergarten, these songs are used to introduce the concept of beat. The students have used body percussion and a variety of percussion instruments to feel and keep the beat. Finally, there's always time for fun songs and silly song: songs that allow the students to have fun and ... well ... be silly. And that's a good thing! So the students are off to a great start. We're going to enjoy a wonderful year of music together

#### Grade 1

In the first term, the grade one students have continued with the study of beat and rhythm. They have learned the difference between beat (the steady pulse in the music) and rhythm (the way the words go) and how to keep the beat or play the rhythm using body percussion or percussion instruments. They are learning to chart the rhythm for simple songs and see the relationship between the rhythm and the beat. These concepts are the foundation for all subsequent musical literacy. An introduction to the xylophones began this term as well. The students are learning proper mallet technique and how to play a two-note chord, called a *bordun*, to accompany simple songs. The students enjoy singing and continue to develop their voices through the many songs we sing.

#### Grade 2

In the first term, the grade two students have reviewed rhythm and beat. They can read and chart the rhythms to simple songs and correct errors if rhythms are charted incorrectly. They have been introduced to the concepts of measure, bar line and time signature and they are beginning to understand the relationship between these terms and the concepts of beat and rhythm. The students have continued to explore music on the pitched percussion instruments (xylophones). They are learning to read and play three-note melodies and accompany these songs with a two-note chord called a *bordun*. The students are continuing to develop their singing voices, and their movement skills. They love to sing, and they participate enthusiastically in movement activities.

#### Grade 3

In the first term, the grade three students have been reviewing the concepts of beat, rhythm and melody and how to identify these concepts in music. They are building on the xylophone-playing skills they developed last year, and are advancing these skills through ongoing practice and more complex musical ideas. For instance, they have learned to accompany several songs with a major and a minor chord and have discussed the difference between the major and minor sound. They have also learned to transpose simple songs to different keys. These are sophisticated musical concepts for grade three students, and I am amazed at their capacity to understand and execute the ideas. They continue to enjoy singing, movement activities, and games. We have a lot of fun together.

#### Grade 4

In the first term, the students have begun to play the recorder. They learned the proper way to hold the instrument, note attack (tonguing), and embouchure (controlled air flow). The students have learned three notes (B, A, and G) and can play a number of BAG tunes. The students' musical knowledge/skill continues to be strengthened through the ongoing study/review of musical concepts (beat, rhythm, notation, etc), pitched and un-pitched instrument playing and singing. The students are enthusiastic about learning the recorder. They are going to make great strides over the year.

#### Grade 5

In music this term, the grade five students have begun to play the ukulele. They have explored tuning, strumming, and proper finger technique for playing chords. They have learned five chords to accompany sung melodies and melodies played on the recorder. In second term, more chords and strumming techniques will be introduced. As well the recorder will continue to be used as a melody instrument to insure that the students maintain their notation reading skills. Grade five is a very musical group.

#### Grade 6

In the first term, the students began playing the guitar. They are learning to read notation for the guitar and can now play melodies on the first two strings. The songs are played ensemble style with some students playing melody and others playing chords on the ukuleles. This helps the students maintain the ukulele-playing skills they acquired last year and prepares the way for chord study on the guitar which will be introduced in the second term. Through the guitar and ukulele studies, the students continue to review and strengthen their knowledge of beat, rhythm, melody, notation, and time signature. The students have a positive attitude toward to music.

#### Grade 7

In the grade seven music program, the students are creating a band. In the first term, the singers and musicians have worked together to learn several songs. Class time is spent learning the melody and accompaniment (guitar, bass, piano and drums), and determining whether the song is better suited to the girls voices or the boys voices (The girls and the boys are sharing the singing). The band is making progress and the students are growing in their skills and confidence.

#### Grade 8

In the grade eight music program, the students are continuing with the 'pop band' direction established last year. In the first term, the singers and musicians have worked together to select and rehearse a number of songs. Class time is spent learning the melody and accompaniment (guitar, bass, drums, piano, and percussion), determining an arrangement for each song, and selecting new material. The students are continuing to grow in knowledge, skill and confidence.

# **Physical Education Across the Grades**

### Kindergarten—Grade 2

This term the early years students were involved in activities to practice and develop some of the fourteen basic movement skills. In particular, we worked on galloping, running and skipping. As well, we learned to use different equipment and played a variety of cooperative and low organized games. We discussed and practiced the rules and routines we use to play safely and fairly in the gym.

### Grades 3-5

During the first term the grade three to five students were involved in the following activities: various sport lead up games, fitness challenges and low organized games. The skills we have focused on developing this term include manipulation skills: passing throwing and catching. We have also worked on the movement skills of running and moving in the gym through our various games and activities. We have also worked on fair play concepts and what that looks like in the gym.

### Grade 6-8

Students in grades six—eight were involved in the following activities: volleyball, fitness challenges and low organized games. We have focused on developing manipulation skills such as overhead and underhand passing and serving. Our fitness challenges have helped the students to identify some goals to work on during the year to improve their overall fitness.



### From the Gym

As usual, the fall has been a very busy time in the gym. All the classes are settled into our routines and are enjoying being physically active.

The primary classes have been working on moving safely in the gym. We have been playing cooperative games and are developing a sense of fair play. We are learning to use a variety of equipment and have been concentrating on throwing and catching activities. Our elementary friends have been playing volleyball lead-up games, participating in fitness challenges and enjoying a variety of low organized games. Our older students have been playing volleyball, working to assess and improve their fitness level and participating in different games and activities.

Our annual Terry Fox Family Walk was held on Thursday, September 13h. It was a great day and everyone enjoyed the pizza after the walk was finished. Thank you to everyone who participated and a special thanks to those who donated to this worthy cause.

Volleyball season is just finishing up. We had four teams on the go (two boys teams and two girls teams) with more than 50 student athletes involved. Through the season the players participated in a number of tournaments (including two hosted at our school) and over 40 league games. Our developmental teams concluded their season with tournaments for boys and girls on November 16th and 17th. Both teams had a remarkable season. We had playoffs playoffs for our grade 7/8 teams during the week of November 19th -23rd. Thank you to everyone who came out to cheer our teams on. Thank you to Mrs. McInnis, Mr. Reyes, Mrs. Rayner, Madame Laird , Madame Curwain and Miss van der Zweep for all of the time dedicated to coaching the teams. As well, thanks to Katie McKenzie and Jonah Lorenzana who refereed through the season, and to Cole Giasson, who agreed to do some training and become our newest ref. I am sure the athletes appreciate it; I know I do!

### French Update

What an exciting and fun-filled first term. All classes have been actively engaged in a wide variety of language-based games/ activities that assist students in learning new vocabulary related to our classroom themes.

Here is what the grades have been up-to:

### Grades 1 & 2

Both groups are eager learners and active participants in all our routine songs and activities focusing on the days of the week, months of the year, and number exercises. Students exposure to new vocabulary taught this term continues to grow. Throughout each theme, students take part in a variety of literacy games and activities that help to promote and reinforce vocabulary and comprehension. The grade 1 class has enjoyed learning the colours in French, along with their corresponding signs. During our Family unit, the grade 2 students enjoyed introducing their family to the class, "Dans ma famille, il y a \_\_\_\_ personnes.". Great work this term!

### Grades 3 & 4

The grades 3 & 4 class has shown great enthusiasm towards learning the French language. This term, students have begun each class with our calendar routine, identifying days of the week, months of the year and recording the temperature. In writing, students are beginning to recognize many common words when reading and answering questions related to our classroom calendar. The groups continue to make a consistent effort to speak French during our calendar question and answer period. Great job!



### <u>Grades 5 & 6</u>

This term, the grades 5 & 6 class has shown steady progress in understanding and following basic French instructions. Students are continuing to work at reading and responding in written form to questions relating to our classroom calendar, as well as utilize their French English dictionaries on a more frequent basis. The grade 5 class did a fabulous job on their final project on la maison. Through their well organized prezi's, the grade 6 students showcased their knowledge of "faire" vs "jouer".

### Grades 7 & 8

Both classes continue to work on curricular outcomes through a variety of routine literacy activities, such as entrance/ exit slips, as well as our question & answer period.

In writing, both classes were able to demonstrate their understanding of French negation through their "J'aime..." and "Je n'aime pas..." phrasing activity. The grades 7 & 8 students should be proud of their hard work conjugating the different forms of regular French verbs.

### **Sustainability**

Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) continues to be one of the school's ongoing priorities as outlined in our School Plan. We have a number of initiatives that are underway to reinforce our core message, "Enough for All, Forever!" Here's what's on the go:

• **Composting** In the spring, Mrs. Pieczonka received a grant from the Government of Manitoba to help start up a composting program at the school. We are working on two components to the composting program. The first part of the composting program is vermicompositing. Vermicomposting makes use of red wriggler worms. They are kept in containers inside and are fed small amounts of vegetation based compost like apple cores, banana peels and those mini carrots that fell on the floor at lunch, oops! This allows the students an opportunity to see composting program is compost pick up. Compost pick up will include any overflow that doesn't make it into the vermicompost, as well as other food scraps and the paper towels from the washrooms. By having our other compost picked up, we can help reduce the amount of waste enter our landfills and have a positive impact on our Earth. We are hoping to begin this program in the new year.


 $\cdot$  100% Recycling into the Recycling Box Our primary goal is zero recycling in the garbage. Often people forget what can be recycled or simply put recyclable items in the nearest bin. Every couple of months, classes will receive a reminder about an item that should or should not be placed in the recycling with a handy little sign located near the recycling bin. • Wasteless/Bottles/Cutlery The school is continuing several practices initiated over the last two years. We encourage everyone to participate in Wastelss Wednesdays. The goal, each Wednesday, is to have no garbage or recycling! We are also continuing to stress the use of refillable water bottles, instead of single use disposable bottles. Finally, students in need of utensils at lunch are making use of their class' reusable cutlery rather than disposable cutlery. Each classroom teacher has a system in place to allow students to borrow and wash these items.

# School Board News Cont'd

#### Financial Report for the year ended June 30, 2018

Enrollment for the 2017/2018 school year was 232 students compared to the prior year of 230. Academic revenue increased as a result of increased number of students as well as an increase in tuition and government grants.

Other revenue increased mainly due to an increase in fundraising revenue. The increase is due to an increase in bingo revenues as the hall was closed for several months in the prior year.

Expenses increased year over year mainly primarily due to annual salary increases for staff and inflation.

During the year the School Board made the decision to no longer proceed with proposed expansion plans. As a result it was necessary to write off previously capitalized costs incurred for the expansion and the related contributions received for a net write off of \$169,606.

The end result for the year is a surplus of \$123,467 from regular operations with a small deficiency of (\$46,139) after the write-off of the proposed expansion costs.
