From The Principal

Mirror, mirror...

Sources differ on how many times a day we see our own reflection in the mirror, but when I started to consider it, I realized for me it was quite a few times between washrooms, the car and assorted other locations. We get very accustomed to seeing ourselves, this begins at a very early age. Babies love looking in mirrors and begin to recognize themselves at around 18 months old, which begins a life-long preoccupation with our appearance. Mirrors hold a certain fascination for us, it is hard not to look. Some of us, a minority would be my guess, like what we see and others are more apt to pick the reflection apart. Either way, they can draw us more into ourselves.

Mirrors feature prominently in our culture. They are in a host of stories, ranging from Snow White and Alice in Wonderland to Dracula and Shakespeare. In the Jewish faith tradition mirrors are covered when a family member dies. Many superstitions exist around mirrors, most notably the seven years bad luck if one is accidentally broken. People believed the mirror reflects the soul and that in breaking it, one's very soul gets damaged.

Mirrors are used in the bible, too. At times, we are told that the people who don't believe can't see the true reflection, it is as if they are looking through a veil. In other passages, we are reminded that we are born to reflect God's image. Scripture flips the concept of the mirror from self- absorption to focusing outward.

As we journey through Lent, our students and staff are working to improve how we reflect God's face to the world. You may have been wondering what those little pieces of mirror were all about. Using the mirror analogy helps us to think of things that stop us from reflecting the glory of God. Mirrors get dirty and need cleaning routinely. We can look at our lives and make sure that we pray regularly and participate in the sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist. Some mirrors distort the image reflected, like fun house mirrors. Are we sure we are on the path that serves God and others, or do we alter what we feel is true and end up serving ourselves? And mirrors do get broken, and become unusable, sharp and somewhat dangerous. Thankfully, unlike literal mirrors, we can call on the grace of God, which can help us repair our lives in times of darkness and trouble.

I hope that this Lenten season offers you opportunities to reflect, pun fully intended, on your spiritual journey. This time leading to the great celebration of Easter calls us all to consider the ways we can mirror God's love for us and for our world.

Physical Education Second Term 2018-19

Kindergarten Grade 1 and 2

During the second term, early years students were involved in a variety of activities to practice and develop some of the fourteen basic movement skills. In particular, we worked on manipulation skills including catching, throwing and striking. We played different lead up games that incorporated all of the basic movement skills. We continued to use a variety of equipment and played an assortment of cooperative and low organized games. Safety and fair play have continued to be a focus.

Grades 3-5

In the second term students have participated in a range of different activities including: striking games, basket-ball and badminton lead-up games and low organized games. The skills we have focused on developing this term include striking skills (kicking a ball, using a racquet, hitting a ball etc.) and movement skills (moving with a bouncing ball, dribbling a soccer ball etc.). An emphasis on fair and safe play is incorporated in all of our activities.

Grades 6-8

During the second term the older students were engaged in an assortment of activities to develop their skills including basketball and badminton. We have focused on developing manipulation skills such as dribbling, passing, shooting and striking a badminton shuttle. Students have continued to work on their personal fitness goals. The concept of team play was developed through basketball and large group team games, while badminton offers students the opportunity to participate in an individual sport.

Festival du Voyageur

The school was buzzing with activity and filled with happy students enjoying the days festivities.

Our day began with a presentation from Monsieur Denis Encontre, a dynamic French fiddler. Students were encouraged to participate and dance while experiencing a taste of French culture. Each class then had an opportunity to take part in indoor stations of arm wrestling, leg wrestling, arm pull & kick the chicken. Outdoor stations included to-boggan races, flag tag, snowshoeing & sponge ball. Following the stations, students partook in grade appropriate crafts relating to the culture and heritage of the Voyageur people.

It was a fabulous day! A huge "merci" to all who helped to make our March 8th, Festival Day a huge success. A special thank-you to the wonderful grade 8 group. Without all of you, the day would have not been possible! Hé Ho!

Français

Here is what we've been up to:

Grade 1 & 2

Throughout the second term, the grade 1 & 2 classes continue to make steady progress in the French program. Students demonstrate active listening and viewing skills that help to improve comprehension. Students really enjoy taking part in a variety of games and songs associated with our classroom themes and units. Each class continues to work on taking risks and developing confidence when speaking French with their peers or when asking to get a drink of water or use the bathroom. Great job!

Grade 3 & 4

Both groups continue to be active participants during French class.

Students have demonstrated their ability to independently identify, name, and use in a proper sentence structure; the days of the week, months of the year, weather and temperature. The classes continue to listen carefully and are able to make sense of what is said with little prompting. Students continue to work at identifying and using high frequency sight words and phrases in their writing. Wonderful job!

Grade 5 & 6

In French this term, both the grade 5 & 6 class has made a good effort applying themselves during all language-based activities. During our unit on "La Famille," the grade 5 class was able to demonstrate their knowledge and comprehension of taught vocabulary through their family tree write-ups. The grade 6 class has become more proficient in decoding texts by recognizing high frequency phrases and taught vocabulary. In turn, students have begun applying these same words and phrases in their "Message du jour". Speaking skills are steadily improving. Great work!

Grade 7 & 8

The grades 7 & 8 class has shown steady progress in all aspects of French. Students are capable of having simple, authentic conversation with their peers. In turn, students have begun applying these same words and phrases in their written work. The grade 7 group was able to showcase their ability to conjugate verbs in the present tense through their gameboards. While the grade 8 class, was able to recognize and implement some different forms of Avoir (I have...) and Être (I am...) when speaking and in their Voyageur mini-books. Fabulous effort!



From the Music Room

Greeting to the school community! The second term of the school year is completed. Although it's the shortest term, the extended hours of darkness and the chilly winter temperatures can make it seem like the longest. But we survived and we're happy to greet the spring and enjoy Spring Break.

Kindergarten

The kindergarten students have continued to learn and grow in their knowledge and appreciation of music. The main learning focus of the second term has been the concept of rhythm: the length of musical sounds. The students have been introduced to a ta (a quarter note), a ti-ti (two eighth notes together), and a sh (a quarter rest). The students can recognize these symbols, clap the sounds they represent, and clap the patterns of ta's, ti-ti's and sh's they see on rhythm flash cards. They have also learned that each of the simple songs they kept the beat to last term has its own rhythm, and that they can clap that rhythm or play it with rhythm sticks by 'following the words'. With the concepts of beat and rhythm now planted in their musical minds, the students are ready to explore the relationship between beat and rhythm. This will be the learning focus of the third term. The students have continued to sing with enthusiasm. They learn songs quickly and sing well as a class. That, along with their joyful participation in movement activities and musical games means our time together is lively and always passes too quickly.

Grade 1

In the second term, the grade one students further developed their xylophone playing skills. They've identified the melody notes in the song *See Saw* as G and E, and, drawing on their knowledge of beat and rhythm learned in first term, can play the song with added accompaniment (a two-note chord called a bordun, bells and other percussion instruments). Movement continues to be a part of the program. The students have been learning to move to the beat with a partner and as a group. The students enjoy music, and they are growing in their musical knowledge.

Grade 2

In the second term, the grade two students continued to develop their skills on the xylophones. Based on the skills acquired last term they can now play several songs with (la/A, so/G, mi/E) with added accompaniment. They have also begun to explore how a song sounds when it is changed from a major key to a minor key, and how to use different types of borduns (solid, broken & and arpeggiated) to support the song. Singing and movement continue to be an important part of the learning. The students are learning to sing in canon format with old favourites like Row your Boat and Frere Jacques.

Grade 3

In the second, the grade three students continued to develop their skills on the xylophones. They can now play five-note songs involving la/A, so/G, mi/E, re/D and do/C with added accompaniment (bordun and percussion) and can transpose these songs to different keys. They continue to sing with enthusiasm and are exploring the challenge and fun of singing in canon format. Their musical knowledge and skills are growing steadily.

Music (cont'd)

Grade 4

In the second term, the students have continued to develop their recorder playing skills. They began the term learning more complex BAG tunes and soon added E, D and high C to their playing range. Their recorder playing skills have greatly improved. Some learning time was devoted to reviewing the instruments of the orchestra and learning about the great composers in preparation for our visit to the concert hall in May to hear the WSO perform. Over the term, the students have participated with enthusiasm in music class.

Grade 5

In the second term, the students have continued to play the ukulele. They have expanded their chord repertoire and continued to develop their strumming skills as they learned to accompany a variety of songs played on the recorder. In the last month of the term, the students have begun the study of *Tablature*: a form of musical notation for stringed instruments. This will allow them to play melodies on the ukulele, which in turn will enhance their finger dexterity on the instrument. The students are enthusiastic about playing the ukulele and about all things musical.

Grade 6

In the second term, the students have continued with guitar. The major focus has been on playing melodies on the first, second, and third strings and accompanying these melodies with chords, bass and drums. The students' chord knowledge is growing and they have learned how to add a simple bass line to the arrangement. They've even added a little electric guitar just to spice things up. The students have maintained an enthusiasm for the guitar and for music in general.

Grade 7

In the second term, the students have continued to work together to select and rehearse songs. A number of current pop tunes have been added to the repertoire. The singers and band members are increasingly adept at learning new songs and establishing a version of the song that works for the group.

Grade 8

In the second term, the students have continued to work together to select and rehearse songs. The singers and the musicians are playing more confidently and taking on songs that are more rhythmically challenging. The students have continued to work together and have put effort into honing their skills as musicians and singers.



Nursery News

Fall has come and gone, winter is almost ready to melt away to spring and flowers will begin to bloom just like all our Little Nursery friends have been doing since the beginning of this school year. They have come leaps and bounds and are no longer those scared little babies who walked through our doors of nursery school in September.

We have been continuing our 'Letter of the Week' and are almost coming to the end of the alphabet. They have been learning letter names and sounds and are trying to write them independently. They have been learning how to write their own names, too.

They have been developing their fine muscles to be able to hold a pencil correctly to print and colour and to hold scissors in the correct position to cut.

They have become very independent in their classroom procedures, getting dressed on their own and making sure their folder and lunch kit is in their backpack before hometime. They also are very good at tidying up when they hear the clean-up song playing and have to put all the toys away. They have learned the importance of working together, sharing and being kind to each other.

With their wonderful imaginations and a few props, they have been mothers, fathers, carpenters and architects, princes and princesses, scientists, artists, doctors, chefs and superheroes. I can't wait to see where their imaginations will take them next.

A big thank you to our class 'grandma', Miss Linda who comes on a regular basis to read to the class and hang around with us to help out where ever needed. The children adore her.

Cooking Club

We have had so much fun at cooking club the past few months. I always look forward to teaching these fun, hands-on type of classes. The children enjoy being involved members of the club. They are a part of the entire process, peeling, chopping, grating and dicing.....some even volunteer to wash dishes!

Cooking with kids has so many valuable benefits. Here are some great reasons to share your kitchen time with your little ones.....whether they're 3 or 13!

Children who cook become children who taste, try and enjoy good food. Involving children in the process of cooking — picking out the watermelons and cucumbers and plucking the leaves of mint to add to a cucumber, watermelon and feta salad, for example — greatly increases the chance that they'll actually try the finished dish. And who knows, they may discover a new favorite. Cultivating a welcoming and open-minded approach to food can grow adults who approach life similarly; an appetite open to new tastes, cultures and attitudes.

Children who cook say "I can," not "I can't." A child who can be involved in the kitchen and produce a dish will be very proud of themselves. They will have an "I can" attitude. Be sure to compliment and encourage your child's creation, no matter how crispy, bland or messy it may be.

Cooking is a way to talk about health. Experts say that the single most important thing you can do for your health is to cook at home. Inviting children into the kitchen and involving them at a very young age fosters a habit that will have lifelong benefits. Also, it gives you an opportunity to discuss with a 3-year-old how fish can help make you smart, how "eating a rainbow" ensures that you get a wide variety of vitamins and minerals, and how eating plenty of fresh vegetables and drinking lots of water will keep your body heathy.

Cooking is a way to talk about healthy ingredients. Children who have made ice cream know what is supposed to be in ice cream. They know they didn't add any modified milk products, or other ingredients that you can't pronounce. They will learn what fresh, clean eating looks like and tastes like. It is so important to educate our children about whole ingredients and how to read labels together.

Cooking brings cooks of all ages closer. You will get to know your children in a different environment when you cook with them. You will share recipes, techniques and anecdotes that you learned at the elbows of mothers, grandmothers and great-grandmothers long gone. Don't forget that children learn from us.....we can teach them patience through showing patience while waiting for them to measure out ingredients. Showing forgiveness when they crack an egg and it lands on the floor.....Cooking together is a gift we can give our children, a special time we can share together in the course of a busy day.

So get your aprons out, roll up your sleeves and get cooking everyone! Here's one of my favorite summer salads....even though it's spring, these ingredients are easily found year round. The refreshing combinations of cucumber and watermelon, salty feta and fresh mint, are stellar!

CUCUMBER, WATERMELON AND FETA SALAD

INGREDIENTS

1/4 c. olive oil

2 tbsp. red wine or balsamic vinegar

1/2 tsp. salt

3 c. cubed seedless watermelon

1 c. medium cucumber, chopped

1 c. crumbled feta

1/2 c. red onion, thinly sliced

1/2 c. coarsely chopped mint

Flaky sea salt, for garnish (optional)

DIRECTIONS

In a small bowl, whisk together olive oil, vinegar, and salt. In a large serving bowl, combine watermelon, cucumber, feta, red onion, and mint. Pour over dressing, tossing to combine.

Garnish with more mint and flaky sea salt.



Sustainability

Spring... what an exciting time for the Earth lovers at St. Alphonsus School!

In March, our school began participating in commercial composting. Each classroom, and room in the school where food is consumed, has a compost collection container. Each day, students and staff are invited to place any food waste products (no liquids, please) into the containers. At the end of the day, the compostable contents of containers are disposed into the collection bin. Weekly, Compost Winnipeg, is picking up the school's compost to take to their facility. Did you know, food waste that ends up in a land fill takes years longer to decompose that food that is composted? Food waste in landfills also produces more harmful green house gases.

Another exciting step in becoming a more sustainable school coming in April is worms! Yes, you read that right, red wriggler compost worms. Several classrooms will be composting directly in their room with the help of red wrigglers. The red wrigglers are a little pickier than the commercial pick up though. They only consume plant based products (fruits, veggies and paper products). Teachers will use vegetation from their collection bins to feed their worms. The worms will provide students with a first-hand, hands-on view of what happens as food is composted. Kuddos to Mrs. Ireland and the grade 1s who already have composting worms!

Thank you for everyone's support and participation in reducing, reusing and recycling in our school community! Remember, God made people stewards of the Earth, so we need to take care of His creation for our Heavenly Father. And, if you're interested in learning more about reducing your carbon footprint by composting at home, feel free to ask you child's classroom teacher, who will happily point you in the right direction.

Student Leadership


Our student leadership committees have been busy "Bee's" throughout the term; discussing and developing ideas relating to enhancing students' sense of belonging, connectedness, and community.


