It seems as though the sun has been very elusive over these months, so much so that a buzz will ripple around the playground when there is a blue sky sighting. Okay, so maybe I am exaggerating a little bit, but the other day in the office, everyone stopped and looked longingly out the window when Mrs. Resendes enthused, "The sun is out!"

Living in Winnipeg, we get kind of spoiled with sunshine. Over the last few summers we have seen nary a cloud in the sky. 
School Plan 2019-20

One of the tasks of the school administration is to develop a plan in consultation with the various members of the community, including staff, students and parents. Many of the initiatives pursued by schools require a long term approach for implementation. As a result, most school plans encompass more than one school year. This practice has been the case in our school; these goals will continue forward into subsequent school years.

Goal 1- Technology

ICT Integration: To move further toward seamless use of technology in learning.

- We will assess current levels of technology infrastructure, determine if additional resources are needed and develop a timeline/plan for increased integration.
- Teachers will meet regularly with our technology support person to discuss methods of integrating technology into different curricular areas.
- Teachers will take part in after school technology sessions, which will cover a variety of topics including: Office 365, Smart/ interactive technology, photo and video editing, etc.
- Teachers will attend professional development in this area, both at MTS PD Day and during the year as opportunities arise



Incorporating Indigenous Education: Developing our understanding of National and Provincial Indigenous Education initiatives.

Teachers will take part in in-service opportunities related to Treaty Relations, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Calls to Action and incorporating indigenous perspectives in different curricular areas.

Kindergarten

The kindergarten students have had a great first term in music. They are an enthusiastic group that loves to sing, move, and engage in learning activities. The term began with songs of welcome as well as call-and-response songs (songs that require an echo response or a sung answer). These songs are introduced to cultivate a feeling of belonging and comfort in the music room and also to help students activate their singing voices. Songs that involve movement are added to further develop those initial elements while helping students to feel the beat in music and to develop a comfort level with controlled movement. Next I introduced a series of instructional songs. These simple songs will be used throughout the year and into grades one and two to teach a host of musical concepts from beat and rhythm to harmony and transposition. In the first term of kindergarten, these songs are used to introduce the concepts of beat (the steady pulse you feel in music) and rhythm (the way the words go). The students have used body percussion and a variety of percussion instruments to feel/keep the beat and play the rhythm. The students are off to a great start. We're going to enjoy a wonderful year of music together.

Grade 1

In the first term, the grade one students have continued with the study of beat and rhythm. They are learning to chart the rhythm for simple songs and see the relationship between the rhythm and the beat. These concepts are the foundation for all subsequent musical literacy. An introduction to the xylophones began this term as well. The students are learning proper mallet technique and how to play a two-note chord, called a *bordun*, to accompany simple songs. The students enjoy singing and continue to develop their voices through the many songs we sing.

Grade 2

In the first term, the grade two students have reviewed rhythm and beat. They can read and chart the rhythms to simple songs and correct errors if rhythms are charted incorrectly. They have been introduced to the concepts of measure, bar line and time signature and they are beginning to understand the relationship between these terms and the concepts of beat and rhythm. The students have continued to explore music on the pitched percussion instruments (xylophones). They are learning to read and play three-note melodies and accompany these songs with a two-note chord called a *bordun*. The students are continuing to develop their singing voices, and their movement skills. They love to sing, and they participate enthusiastically in movement activities.

Grade 3

In the first term, the grade three students have been reviewing the concepts of beat, rhythm and melody and how to identify these concepts in music. They are building on the xylophone-playing skills they developed last year, and are advancing these skills through ongoing practice and more complex musical ideas. For instance, they have learned to transpose simple songs to different keys. It is exciting to see them grasping and executing more complex musical ideas. They continue to enjoy singing, movement activities, and games. We have a lot of fun together.

Grade 4

In the first term, the students have begun to play the recorder. They learned the proper way to hold the instrument, note attack (tonguing), and embouchure (controlled air flow). The students have learned three notes (B, A, and G) and can play a number of BAG tunes. The students' musical knowledge/skill continues to be strengthened through the ongoing study/review of musical concepts (beat, rhythm, notation, etc), pitched and un-pitched instrument playing and singing. The students are enthusiastic about learning the recorder. They are going to make great strides over the year.

Grade 5

In music this term, the grade five students have begun to play the ukulele. They have explored tuning, strumming, and proper fingering technique for playing chords. They have learned nine chords to accompany sung melodies and melodies played on the recorder. They have also learned to play several melodies on the ukulele using a form of musical notation called tablature. The review and expansion of the students' standard notation reading skills continues with each new recorder melody. Grade five is a very musical group.

Grade 6

In the first term, the students began playing the guitar. They are learning to read notation for the guitar and can now play melodies on the first three strings. The songs are played ensemble style with some students playing melody and others playing chords on the ukuleles. This helps the students maintain the ukulele-playing skills they acquired last year and prepares the way for chord study on the guitar which will be introduced in the second term. Through the guitar and ukulele studies, the students continue to review and strengthen their knowledge of beat, rhythm, melody, notation, and time signature. The students have a positive attitude toward to music.

Grade 7

In the grade seven music program, the students are creating a band. In the first term, the singers and musicians have worked together to learn several songs. Class time is spent learning the melody and accompaniment (guitar, ukulele, bass, piano and drums). The band is making progress and the students are growing in their skills and confidence.

Grade 8

In the grade eight music program, the students are continuing with the 'pop band' direction established last year. In the first term, the singers and musicians have worked together to select and rehearse a number of songs. Class time is spent learning the melody and accompaniment (guitar, bass, drums, piano, and percussion), determining an arrangement for each song, and selecting new material. The students are continuing to grow in knowledge, skill and confidence.

Physical Education Across the Grades

Kindergarten—Grade 2

This term the early years students were involved in activities to practice and develop some of the fourteen basic movement skills. In particular, we worked on galloping, running and skipping. As well, we learned to use different equipment and played a variety of cooperative and low organized games. We discussed and practiced the rules and routines we use to play safely and fairly in the gym.

Grades 3-5

During the first term the grade three to five students were involved in the following activities: various sport lead up games, fitness challenges and low organized games. The skills we have focused on developing this term include manipulation skills: passing throwing and catching. We have also worked on the movement skills of running and moving in the gym through our various games and activities. We have also worked on fair play concepts and what that looks like in the gym.

Grade 6-8

Students in grades six—eight were involved in the following activities: volleyball, fitness challenges and low organized games. We have focused on developing manipulation skills such as overhead and underhand passing and serving. Our fitness challenges have helped the students to identify some goals to work on during the year to improve their overall fitness.



From the Gym

As usual, the fall has been a very busy time in the gym. All the classes are settled into our routines and are enjoying being physically active.

The primary classes have been working on moving safely in the gym. We have been playing cooperative games and are developing a sense of fair play. We are learning to use a variety of equipment and have been concentrating on throwing and catching activities. Our elementary friends have been playing volleyball lead-up games, participating in fitness challenges and enjoying a variety of low organized games. Our older students have been playing volleyball, working to assess and improve their fitness level and participating in different games and activities.

Our annual Terry Fox Family Walk was held on Thursday, September 12th. It was a great day and everyone enjoyed the pizza after the walk was finished. Thank you to everyone who participated and a special thanks to those who donated to this worthy cause.

Volleyball season is just finishing up. We had four teams on the go (two boys teams and two girls teams) with more than 50 student athletes involved. Through the season the players participated in a number of tournaments (including two hosted at our school) and over 40 league games. Our developmental teams concluded their season with tournaments for boys and girls on November 14th and 15th. Both teams had a remarkable season. We had playoffs for our grade 7/8 teams during the week of November 25th-30th. Thank you to everyone who came out to cheer our teams on. Thank you to Miss Bommersbach, Mrs. McInnis, Mr. Reyes, Mrs. Rayner, Madame Laird, Madame Curwain and Miss van der Zweep for all of the time dedicated to coaching the teams. As well, thanks to Katie McKenzie, Ben McKenzie and Jonah Lorenzana who refereed through the season. I am sure the athletes appreciate it; I know I do!

Our next inter-school sport is basketball. That's all for now. If you have any questions or concerns about the Physical Education program, please come by the gym or call me at the school. Take care and stay active!

French Update

Here we are at the end of a fabulous first term. Since September each grade has made great strides during French class. The students' eagerness to learn, participation during class time and efforts have definitely made this term a memorable one!

What we've been learning

Grades 1 & 2

To begin each class, students actively take part in our "Bonjour" song and with assistance are able to independently ask their peers how they are feeling today, "Comment ça va?" We sing songs and play literacy games to help reinforce vocabulary related to our classroom calendar (days of the week, months of the year, and number recognition to 20). Both classes have done well learning French words and phrases connected to our classroom themes of colours, family, and winter clothing.

Grades 3 & 4

The grade 3 and 4 students' begin each French class taking part in a variety of oral activities related to; day of the week, month of the year, patterning, identifying numbers from 1-30 in French. Students are working at being able to read and respond in written form to simple questions relating to our classroom calendar. The grade 3 class has worked exceptionally hard on their booklet "les couleurs du zoo," while the grade 4 class did an amazing job creating their own songs titled "Dans mon sac à dos."

Grades 5 & 6

Students' have made a great effort applying themselves during class time. Both classes have been working at recognizing "les mots amis vs. les mots familiers ". The recognition of these common words and phrases have assisted students in their reading and writing of simple sentences related to our classroom themes (les prepositions, les sports and la maison).

Grades 7 & 8

Each French class students' practice on improving their oral communication skills and pronunciation with their clock partners. They continue to build on their reading comprehension and written communication of regular French verbs while working in their cahiers at the beginning of each class. All students' are continuing to work at recognizing when and how to use the proper adjectives of French nouns (le, la, les).

Sustainability

• **Composting** is well underway at the school. Each week since the spring, the school has had our compost commercially picked up. Originally we began with a much smaller bin, but the students and staff have really taken on the compost initiative, and we had to upsize the bin to accommodate all the school's compostable materials. We are also moving toward using compostable cups, plates and cutlery for school events with Mrs. McInnis' help.

<u>Did you know:</u> In addition to food scraps, paper towel and facial tissue is compostable?! Thank you to all the students who have helped collect have been composting! They're a great green team!

Vermicomposting is also continuing in many classrooms. Those are the red wriggler worms kept in containers indoors and are handily little friends to help learn about many curricular outcomes. If you're interested in learning about composting at home, contact Mrs. Pieczonka, she will be happy to point you in the right direction.

• 100% Recycling into the Recycling Box continues to be another important sustainability goal. With ongoing reminders, we have seen an increase of recyclable items ending up in the blue bin! Great work students!

Rudolph Sticks

INGREDIENTS

5 celery ribs, ends trimmed and cut in half peanut butter (or seed butter of choice) 20 pretzels, cut in half 20 chocolate chips or raisins 10 fresh raspberries

INSTRUCTIONS

Slather the nut or seed butter into the celery ribs. Add the antlers, eyes, and nose for the full Rudolph face.



Mulled Apple Cider

There are certain scents that remind us of Christmas. Mulled apple cider wafting through the house is one of them. The best part is, this recipe only takes about 5 minutes to put together and can be made in the slow cooker. There's nothing better than the fragrant aromatic spices filling our homes over the holidays!

8 cups apple juice

¼ cup brown sugar

4 whole cinnamon sticks

1 tsp whole cloves

1 star anise (optional)

1 orange, sliced

Place everything into a slow cooker and cook on high for 1 ½ hours or low for 3 hours. Once ready to serve, remove spices and cooked fruit, and top with fresh sliced fruit such as green apples, red apples, freshly sliced lemon or oranges and cranberries. That's what I call Christmas in a cup!

Christmas Apple "Nachos"

This remains one of my kids favorite Christmas appetizers. It is so versatile, you can basically customize it to your family's likings, or, if you're anything like me you can clean out all of the odds and ends from your pantry!

Financial Report for the year ended June 30, 2019

For 2018/2019 enrollment remained at the 2017/2018 level of 232 students.

Academic revenue increased due to an increase in tuition fees and inflationary increases in government grants.

Other revenue increased due to increased Alternate Kindergarten usage combined with increased Capital Charge fees and Volunteer Incentive fees.

Expenses increased year over year mainly primarily due to annual salary increases for staff and inflation combined with increased repairs and maintenance costs and increased bingo payouts.

The result for the year is a surplus of \$123,791 that was used to fund capital purchases.



The grade 7 and 8 social justice leaders are taking on the task of educating the staff and students for the social justice campaigns. They spend time researching and preparing presentation for each class in the


