St. Alphonsus School News Third Term - June 2020





From The Principal

Although it seems like a lifetime ago, a few short months ago, at the end of February, we started our Lenten journey. Before long fears of the looming pandemic were spreading and then, without real warning we were all cast into lockdown. Calendars were upended, schools were closed and in a very real way it felt like our lives were put on hold. If we think of Lent as a time of prayer and sacrifice, then this was a Lent without parallel. I am sure that like me, you were praying for an end to the situation, praying for the areas most impacted by this disease, praying for the physical and mental health of family and friends, and praying for the strength to move forward as the weeks turned into months. And sacrifice, so much sacrifice around the world this spring! We fasted from visiting family, hugging friends and playing together. None of us would have set these as our Lenten goals, because they are too difficult and too unfathomable in a normal year. Despite the calendar declaring that Easter was upon us, it

seemed as though Lent continued as we stayed home and our community remained quiet. Then slowly, very slowly, we began to see changes. Businesses began to reopen, people began to return to work and finally we could open schools in a small but important first step. For me, that is when it felt like Easter, as if our resurrection was finally here.

This year our Lenten theme was "Build Each Other Up", which we symbolized with Lego blocks. I had fully intended on using that theme for my reflection for the March newsletter, but it felt so hard, perhaps even trivial, to compile a newsletter in the throes of a pandemic. We had a Lego wall, which students could add to when they felt they had built someone up or had felt uplifted by the actions of another. At one point after the school shut, I had pulled the wall down. Its crumbling into pieces felt like an analogy to what was happening in the world, a sad day for certain. When the first students came back in June, they remarked on the missing Lego wall, remembering the fun they had, all the while reflecting on how we build community. These conversations reignited my desire to write about this theme, as we celebrate this belated Easter.

I have always been proud of how the members of our school community supported each other and the broader community, but never was this truer than through this spring. Staff members shared time, talents and resources to make remote learning a reality. Parents responded with support and thanks for our efforts. Students reached out to acknowledge gifts and express gratitude. Our community came together early in the pandemic to support Winnipeg Harvest and then a second time for Sagkeeng First Nation. Staff came out to sort and deliver our Glenlea Greenhouse plants. We thought of creative ways to honour and celebrate our farewells. Our PALs hosted a fun Ice Cream Drive Thru. Although none of the spring was as expected, in the end it was good, because we sought ways to build each other up and in doing so, built up our community.



We know that our challenges are not over yet; we still have work to do to

keep ourselves and those around us safe. There is still uncertainty and the potential for things to crumble again. Still, I feel confident that we will be able to rebuild each time this happens. Just like a bin of Lego pieces, when we join together the possibilities are endless!

<u>St Alphonsus School</u> <u>Annual Community Report 2019-2020</u>

Each school in the province must provide an annual school report for the community. The purpose of the report is to share some school profile information, report on various steps taken to meet school improvement goals and to outline other action plans underway in the school. Please take some time to review this report. Should you have any questions or comments regarding any information therein, or if you would like to have input regarding plans for the coming year, please contact the principal or one of the School Board members. You are also welcome to share your ideas at the PALS meeting on Tuesday, September 10th or the School Board Meeting on Wednesday, September 11th. Your ideas are welcome and play an important role in shaping the school's direction and future.

School Profile

St. Alphonsus School is a K-8 Catholic School. This year, the student population was 229, and the staff consisted of fourteen certified teachers, seven educational assistants, an office manager, a financial administrator, a building manager and a custodian. Additionally, we have a nursery program providing academic and social learning to 35 preschool aged children. As well as providing the provincial core curriculum, the school offers religious instruction, basic French instruction (grade 1-8) and resource support.

School Plan 2019-20

One of the tasks of the school administration is to develop a plan in consultation with the various members of the community, including staff, students and parents. Many of the initiatives pursued by schools require a long term approach for implementation. As a result, most school plans encompass more than one school year. This practice has been the case in our school. After priorities were identified, strategies were developed in alignment with our goals. The plan was formalized and put into effect.

Goal 1- Technology

ICT Integration: To move further toward seamless use of technology in learning.

Technology has always been an important part of the education program a our school, but the COVID-19 crisis and the subsequent transition to online/remote learning highlighted its importance in new and challenging ways. In addition to acting swiftly and thoughtfully to the challenges of remote education we also managed to work on a number of our objectives.

We Have conducted an assessment of our current levels of technology infrastructure, and determined what additional resources are needed. We anticipate making these purchases through the summer, so that things are ready to go come September. Over our time at school, teachers met regularly with our technology support person to discuss methods of integrating technology into different curricular areas. As well, staff took part in after school technology sessions, which covered a variety of topics including Office 365 and Smart/ interactive technology. Some teachers had the opportunity to attend professional development in this area, although the spring conferences were cancelled.

Goal 2 - Indigenous Education

Incorporating Indigenous Education: Developing our understanding of National and provincial Indigenous Education initiatives.

Annual Community Report cont'd

Teachers took part in in-service opportunities related to treaty relations, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Calls to Action and incorporating indigenous perspectives in different curricular areas. We received a Treaty Education Kit that offers programming across grade levels to help both staff and students understand the role that treaties have played in the shaping of Canada. The staff wrote a land acknowledgement that was introduced at a school assembly. We invited indigenous educator Renee McGurry to share some of her experiences and stories with us during I love to Read Month. Teachers were actively tracking how they integrated indigenous perspectives across different subject areas, but did not get a chance to present these achievements through the spring. Although we made a start in this area, we will continue to work towards this goal in the coming year.

Goal 3 – Enhanced Programming

Enhanced Programming Opportunities: Extracurricular activities that further student learning.

The staff explored enhanced programming opportunities for students at all grade levels. We were pleased to be able to offer Robotics, Mad Science, Code Cobras, and Craft Clubs this year. We hope to be able to continue, and perhaps expand, this programming in the coming year.

In Summary

This year did not proceed as anyone expected. That said, our staff worked hard in many areas, both before and during the pandemic. We will continue to look at our strategic plan in collaboration with the board in the coming school year and determine the best next steps for our school community. Thank you to all members of the community-students, staff and parents— for your ongoing support of the school. Together we make St. Alphonsus School a great place to be.

Have your child do a small job, grate the cheese, peel the carrot, dice the cucumber etc. The more they familiarize themselves in the kitchen the more comfortable they will feel. Here is a fun summer snack for your family to enjoy!

Everything tastes better on a skewer! Try making these easy cucumber-feta-watermelon bites.

For the balsamic glaze:

1 cup balsamic vinegar

2 tablespoons brown sugar

For the skewers:

16 watermelon balls or cubes (you will need a melon baller to make them into balls)4 ounces block feta in brine, cut into squares, or

bocconcini cheese balls

1-2 small seedless cucumbers, peeled and sliced16 mint leaves or basil leaves

16 wooden skewers or toothpicks

Instructions:

For the balsamic glaze:

Combine vinegar and sugar in a small saucepan. Bring to a boil and reduce to low and simmer until mixture has reduced and reached a syrupy consistency (about 15-20 minutes).

You can use store bought balsamic glaze *note, balsamic glaze is different from balsamic vinegar. It has a thick, syrup-like consistency.

For the skewers:

When ready to serve, thread everything onto the toothpicks, or skewers. Starting with the water-melon, then mint(basil), then feta(bocconcini) and cucumber. Drizzle with balsamic glaze. Enjoy the burst of flavours in your mouth! Sweet, salty and delicious all in the same bite!
