### September

### October

On October 6th our grade seven and eight classes held our annual **Junior High Retreat** Day. The theme of the day was Resilience. It was a perfect day for prayer, games and team-building.



Our **Student Led Conferences** took place on October 22nd and 24th. Although we were online this year, as always these conferences provided an opportunity to celebrate student learning and to set goals for the school year. Feedback from the students, parents and teachers was positive. We came out of the conferences feeling a sense of direction and purpose.

On October 23rd we held a Hats for Hope Fundraiser to raise funds for Brain Tumour Research. Everyone donned their toques and ballcaps to mark this day. The school community raised an mazing \$1,232 .00 for this organization.



Our Parent Association and staff hosted a **Hallowee'en Drive Through** on Thursday, October 29th. Families brought a non-perishable food bank item and received a treat from our crew. It was a lot of fun and it was great to see so much support for Winnipeg Harvest.

### November

The pandemic restrictions have impacted every aspect of society, and the students and I have certainly felt that impact in the music program. Not being able to sing has hampered our ability to make music and make music a part of our broader school experience. However, resilience is the name of the game and with a few adjustments and a bit of creativity we have managed do a little learning and have a little fun. I have outlined what each of the grades has been working on during the first term. If you have any questions or concerns regarding this information or any aspect of the music program, please contact me at the school. I'd be happy to speak with you.

#### Kindergarten

Over the term, the classes begin with a song for listening purposes as well as for movement. The movement allows the students to engage in the song and develop a sense of belonging and togetherness normally done through singing. The song becomes a platform for exploring *beat* (the steady pulse you feel in music) and *rhythm* (the way the words go). The students use body percussion and a variety of percussion instruments to feel/keep the beat and play the rhythm. The students have learned several rhythm symbols (*ta* = a quarter note, *ti*-*ti* = two eighth notes, *sh* = a quarter rest) and they practice reading and clapping them with flash cards and online games. They have also been introduced to the notion of *tempo* (the speed of music) and through games and activities can identify songs as fast or slow and note when the temp changes in a song. The students are off to a good start and we will continue to explore musical ideas together.

#### Grade 1

In the first term, the students have continued with the study of beat and rhythm and have expanded their rhythm vocabulary to include the half note and the whole note. They are learning to track the rhythm for simple songs and see the relationship between rhythm and beat. These concepts are the foundation for all subsequent musical literacy. An introduction to the xylophones began this term as well. The students are learning proper mallet technique and how to play a simple two-note song. They have also begun to explore the musical staff, learning to identify the treble and bass clefs and how to identify the position of notes on the Grand Staff. Online games, movement and the use of percussion instruments help students to feel the music and engage in the learning.

#### Grade 2

In the first term, the students have reviewed the rhythm and beat concepts they learned in previous grades and are using that knowledge to track and play the rhythm in songs. They have continued to explore music on the pitched percussion instruments (xylophones), and they are learning to read and play simple melodies and accompany these melodies with a two-note chord called a *bordun*. They did a unit on the instruments of the orchestra and have reviewed the placement of notes on the staff in preparation for an introduction to reading music.

#### Grade 3

The focus for the Grade Three program this year is the keyboard. The school purchased a classroom set of keyboards to be used by the Grade 3 & 4 students (keyboards are sanitized after every use). Over the term, the students have learned a variety of functions on the keyboard. They have been developing their right and left-hand technique and have learned to read an introductory form of musical notation to play melodies that utilize the right and left hand. In the coming weeks the students will begin to explore standard musical notation for piano (written on the bass and treble clefs). Students who take piano lessons and can already read music are provided with music appropriate to their skill level. They may also work on songs from their out-of-school program during practice time. The parish hall is a great venue for a keyboard class; the two-metre distance allows each student to better hear her/his own keyboards. Every cloud has a silver lining. The students are enjoying the keyboards and making real progress.

#### Grade 4

The focus for the Grade Four program this year is the keyboard. The school purchased a classroom set of keyboards to be used by the Grade 3 & 4 students (keyboards are sanitized after every use). Over the term, the students have learned a variety of functions on the keyboard. They have been developing their right and left-hand technique and have learned to read an introductory form of musical notation to play melodies that utilize the right and left hand. In the coming weeks the students will begin to explore standard musical notation for piano (written on the bass and treble clefs). Students who take piano lessons and can already read music are provided with music appropriate to their skill level. They may also work on songs from their out-of-school program during practice time. The parish hall is a great venue for a keyboard class; the two-metre distance allows each student to better hear her/his own keyboards. Every cloud has a silver lining. The students are enjoying the keyboards and making real progress.

#### Grade 5

In music this term, the Grade Five students have begun to play the ukulele. They have explored tuning, strumming, and proper fingering technique for playing chords. Their chord repertoire is expanding, and they have also learned to play several melodies on the ukulele using a form of musical notation called tablature. The students are enjoying the instrument, and many students are taking ukuleles home on weekends to practice.

#### Grade 6

In the first term, the students began playing the guitar. They are learning to read notation for the guitar and can now play melodies on the first and second strings. They have also learned a number of chords so that the songs can be played ensemble style with some students playing melody and others playing chords. To jazz up the arrangement we've added drums, bass & electric guitar. Students are learning how to keep a basic beat on the drums and create a bass line. Piano, synthesizer and violin (for those who play keyboard and violin) have also been added. The parish hall works well for creating a 'bigger' sound.

#### Grade 7

The Grade Seven music program would typically focus on creating a band with guitars, bass, drums, keyboard and voice. Since we can't sing, the focus has shifted to instrumental music. Some time was spent reviewing notation reading skills and melodies from Grade six. Now the students are expanding their song repertoire. Electric guitar, bass drums and keyboard are used, adding colour and variation to the music and providing students with opportunities to try these instruments. The band is making progress and the students are growing in their skills and confidence.

#### Grade 8

As with the Grade Seven program, the Grade Eight music program would typically focus on creating a band with guitars, bass, drums, keyboard and voice. Since we can't sing, the focus has shifted to instrumental music. Some time was spent reviewing notation reading skills and melodies from Grade six. Now the students are expanding their repertoire of songs. Electric guitar, bass drums and keyboard are used to add colour and variation to the music and provide students with opportunities to try these instruments. It's unfortunate that we can't do the rock band thing, but the students are working hard and growing in their skills and confidence.

### From the Gym

Wow, what a strange fall this has been!

The Physical Education program started outdoors at the beginning of September and then moved into a hybrid model, with some out and some inside activities. Once schools were moved in the orange Response Level, all classes were shifted outside to allow for greater spacing between students when inside. For the most part, things have gone very well. The fall has been relatively mild, so being outside over the day has not been a problem. As we shift to colder temperatures, some of our older, more fashion conscious students may find it a bit more uncomfortable. I tell them that there is a price one has to pay for fashion, which gets me a few chuckles and the occasional eye roll. The more sophisticated students have less appreciation for my sense of humour. Really, I encourage everyone to come prepared so that Phys Ed class can be an active enjoyable experience for all.

I have to say, there have been a few positives resulting from these outdoor sessions. The children have had much more fresh air over the last few months. They are learning to engage in play and to try a variety of activities to keep active and improve their fitness. We are looking at adding some alternatives as we head deeper into the winter to keep things interesting and fresh.

I hope you and your family keep safe, healthy and active in the months ahead.

### French Update

#### French News across the grades

1ier année- The grade one class are an excited bunch, eager to learn and engage during French time. Students begin each class with our routine greeting "Bonjour comment ça va?", followed by chanting days of the week, months of the year, and a dance party counting from 1-10 in French. Throughout our theme on colours students read the book "Les feuilles" and participated in literacy games and activities such as Lotto and memory. Presently, the grade one class is learning vocabulary related to our winter theme, focusing on the parts needed to build to a snowman.

2ieme année- The grade 2 class is an energized group who shows enthusiasm towards learning French. Each class, time is devoted to our calendar routine; chanting the days of the week, months of the year and the four seasons. Students enjoyed taking part in our *Tout sur Moi* theme, where they were able to describe themselves, share their favourite colour and animal in French. Currently, the class is reading Little Critter books in French and taking part in chants associated with our theme *La famille*.

3ieme année- The grade 3 class began the term reviewing calendar vocabulary; days of week, months of year, and seasons. Students took part in a variety of literacy-based activities related to our theme on weather to help promote and reinforce vocabulary and comprehension. The class enjoyed our book study "Les Animaux du Zoo". Students were able to recognize, identify, and label the different animals and their colours.

4ieme année- In French, the grade 4 class continues to show a genuine interest in learning French. During our *L' École* unit, students were able to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of newly taught vocabulary through their "Sac a Dos" mini posters. Currently, the class is learning French vocabulary related to our study of Les Animaux Sauvages vs. Les Animaux de la Ferme. The grade 4 class is looking forward to continuing their Research on their animal and the creation of their dioramas.

5ieme année- Throughout the first term, the grade 5 class continues to work on calendar recognizing written numbers in French and correctly phrasing the date "Aujourd'hui, Hier était, Demain se sera". We began the year focusing on dictionary skills that help students to improve their spelling, fosters reading comprehension and writing independence. The class had a blast showcasing their knowledge of French prepositions and vocabulary related to our unit *La Maison* through their magazine art.

6ieme année- In French, the grade 6's begin each class working on *Message du jour*, an important component to balanced literacy. This helps to actively engaged the class in thematic study, as well as, reinforce proper French spelling, phrasing and reading. Students were able to demonstrate their knowledge of "j'aime, j'adore, je n'aime pas & je déteste" phrasing on their jigsaw puzzles. The group furthered their understanding by incorporating these phrases in with their *jouer vs faire* poster project.

7ieme année- This term, the grade 7's focused on the introduction of regular "er" verbs and their proper conjugation forms. Students were asked to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of "er" conjugations through their Halloween Art activity. Presently, the class is continuing to work with the text "Habiller Dans le Noir". Students have been able to properly sequence the story in French, fill in the missing information, and properly conjugate the "er" verbs within the text.

8ieme année- The grade 8 class continues to show progress in reading and writing through their cahier entries. The beginning of term, the class focused on the text "Frankenstien", where students worked on reading and re-reading the text for comprehension and fluency, as well as, sequencing the story and filling in missing information in French. During part of our unit on Être and Avoir, the grade eights were able to create a celebrity "Qui suis-je?", highlighting their ability to properly use the irregular French verbs in a complete sentence format. Currently, the class is working on completing their booklet project reviewing all regular er, re, & ir French

# School Board News Cont'd

#### Financial Report for the year ended June 30, 2020

For 2019/2020 enrollment decreased to 230 from the 2019/2020 level of 232 students.

Academic revenue increased due to inflationary increases in government grants partially offset by decreased enrollment.

Other revenue decreased due to closure of Alternate Kindergarten, Nursery, Before and After, Bingo and Gym rentals at the end of March due to COVID. This has been partially offset by offering an afternoon care program for Nursery which operated from September to March.

Expenses decreased from prior year primarily as a result Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS) reducing salary costs. In 2019/2020 \$84,200 was spent on capital purchases, specifically a new sound system in gym, additional computer equipment for students and a washroom in Nursery / Before and After room.
