# School Plan 2022-23

One of the tasks of the school administration is to develop a plan in consultation with the various members of the community, including staff, students and parents. Many of the initiatives pursued by schools require a long-term approach for implementation. As a result, most school plans encompass more than one school year. This practice has been the case in our school; these goals will continue forward into subsequent school years.

### Goal 1- Mental Health

Supporting Student Mental Health: Assessing current practices and developing a school wide plan for the delivery of mental health initiatives.

- This goal is a continuation from last year, as we felt it merited continued work in light of our experiences with and observations of students. We looked at our programming last year and added some additional pieces. We will continue to evaluate current programming at different grade levels, investigate programming options that come available and adjust our programming as needed.
- Teachers will meet regularly to discuss strategies to support all students' mental wellness.
- Our resource program will continue to explore options at the divisional and community levels for students with more profound mental health issues.

Staff will take part in additional in-service sessions related to mental health in order to build our capacity for managing the increase in student mental health issues.

# **Goal 2** -Numeracy Education

Numeracy Education: To deepen students understanding of numerical concepts.

We will identify areas of strength as well as challenge in our students understanding of math concepts at all grade levels.

Teachers will implement best practice in numeracy education, as determined through research.

Teachers will seek opportunities to share interesting ideas, both within our staff as well as with colleagues in other schools.

Teachers will attend professional development in this area, both at MTS PD Day and during the year as opportunities arise

### **Ongoing Priorities**

The Staff will continue to work on our most recent priority areas including **Technology, Sustainability** and **Indigenous Education.** 

Although these are not officially on our plan, we want to capitalize on the gains made in these areas and use this momentum to continue work in these areas.

# From the Music Room

# From the Music Room Term 1 2022-23

The Music Room has been busy place as unique and united students learn and grow together, strive for excellence always (in all ways), and have fun!

### The Four Essential Learning Areas in Music

The K-8 Manitoba Music Curriculum provides a framework to "support, nurture and inspire every learner as a music-maker". Musical Language and Performance, Creative Expression, Understanding Music in Context and Valuing Musical Experience, are the four areas identified to promote musically literate individuals. These essential learning areas in music are intended to work simultaneously, with classroom activities tailored to the unique circumstances of each learner and learning environment.

### Kindergarten

Students are establishing a foundation for meaningful musical experiences as they are exposed to making music in a school setting. Basic concepts, such as high and low pitch, fast and slow tempo, and loud and soft dynamics are explored through songs, stories, and games. Students demonstrate their creative responses to music during movement activities and through visual art. Awareness of our unique singing voices, and becoming familiar with playing percussion instruments together, are areas of emphasis.

### Grades 1-3

Fundamental ensemble skills, such as starting and stopping together, maintaining a steady pulse, and following the conductor's cues, are emphasized, when singing and playing simple folk tunes. Using Orff instruments (a collection of xylophones, drums, and other non-pitched percussion instruments), elements of melody, harmony, rhythm, and expression are explored. Students are guided in purposeful listening for accurate intonation and awareness of patterns and structures in music. Specific terminology and systems of writing notation are introduced and practiced, to communicate musical ideas effectively.

### Grades 4-6

Students build on the concepts established in earlier years to create, perform, and respond to music with greater complexity. Specific instrumental techniques are introduced and practiced. Independence and autonomy in performance and ensemble skills, are demonstrated when co-creating in small groups. Students use standard notation and tablature when composing and interpreting music. Specific vocabulary is applied when analyzing songs and discussing musical topics. In Grade Four, students are working with electric keyboards. The Grade Five Class is demonstrating their musical skills on the ukulele, while the Grade Six Class is developing their guitar technique and knowledge.

### **Grades Seven and Eight**

The Junior High Arts program at St. Alphonsus allows for in-depth learning in Music and Visual Art. Smaller class sizes and scheduled double periods of music promotes student-lead inquiry into a wide range of topics. Creative collaboration is evident in these classes. Students use artistic decision-making and problem-solving when making music together, using a variety of available instruments. They show versatility and curiosity when applying theory concepts and when analyzing music.

### **Choirs and Christmas Concert**

Enthusiastic singers have begun to meet regularly as a **Junior High Choir** and a **Grades 4-6 Choir**. These ensembles will be performing as opportunities arise and providing leadership during school Masses. We are working diligently on our **K-6 Christmas Concert** to be performed (live!) on **December 21**<sup>st</sup>. Stay tuned for details.

# **Physical Education Across the Grades**

# Kindergarten—Grade 2

This term the early years students were involved in activities to practice and develop some of the fourteen basic movement skills. In particular, we worked on galloping, running and skipping. As well, we learned to use different equipment and played a variety of cooperative and low organized games. We discussed and practiced the rules and routines we use to play safely and fairly in the gym.

### Grades 3-5

During the first term the grade three to five students were involved in the following activities: various sport lead up games, fitness challenges and low organized games. The skills we have focused on developing this term include manipulation skills: passing throwing and catching. We have also worked on the movement skills of running and moving in the gym through our various games and activities. We have also worked on fair play concepts and what that looks like in the gym.

### Grade 6-8

Students in grades six—eight were involved in the following activities: volleyball, fitness challenges and low organized games. We have focused on developing manipulation skills such as overhead and underhand passing and serving. Our fitness challenges have helped the students to identify some goals to work on during the year to improve their overall fitness.



# From the Gym

Now that we have emerged from restrictions, the fall has been a very busy time in the gym. All the classes are settled into our routines and are enjoying being physically active.

The primary classes have been working on moving safely in the gym. We have been playing cooperative games and are developing a sense of fair play. We are learning to use a variety of equipment and have been concentrating on throwing and catching activities. Our elementary friends have been playing volleyball lead-up games, participating in fitness challenges and enjoying a variety of low organized games. Our older students have been playing volleyball, working to assess and improve their fitness level and participating in different games and activities.

Our annual Terry Fox Family Walk was held on Thursday, September 15th. It was a great day and everyone enjoyed the pizza after the walk was finished. Thank you to everyone who participated and a special thanks to those who donated to this worthy cause.

Volleyball season is just finishing up. We had five teams on the go (two boys teams and three girls teams) with more than 50 student athletes involved. Through the season the players participated in a number of tournaments (including two hosted at our school) and over 40 league games. Our developmental teams concluded their season with tournaments for boys and girls on November 17th and 18th. Both teams had a remarkable season. We had playoffs for our grade 7/8 teams during the week of November 21st-29th. Thank you to everyone who came out to cheer our teams on. Thank you to Mrs. Toews, Mrs. McInnis, Mrs. Rayner, Mrs. Seaman, Madame Laird, Madame Curwain and Mrs. Ireland for all of the time dedicated to coaching the teams. As well, thanks to Mr. Beilman and Santi Galapon who refereed through the season. I am sure the athletes appreciate it; I know I do!

# French Update

What an exciting first term! All classes have been actively engaged in a wide variety of language-based games/ activities that assist students in learning new vocabulary related to our classroom themes.

Here is what the grades have been up-to:

### Grade 1

The grade one class has shown a keen interest towards learning French. Students actively participate in all routine activities and songs related to: the days of the week, months of the year, colours and counting to 10. Their exposure to new themed vocabulary taught this term continues to grow. The class listens carefully to oral instruction while using visual cues to help them with comprehension. During our unit on "L'automne" students were successful at correctly naming and labelling Fall colours in French. Great work!

### Grade 2

In French, the grade two class is an attentive group who pays attention to explanations and uses visual cues to help with comprehension. During class students take part in a variety of songs, games, and language-based activities to help enrich their language development. The grade two class has shown great enthusiasm towards learning French, especially during our current unit "La Famille". Students are able to visually and orally name and identify family members in French, such as ma maman, mon papa, ma sœur, mon frère, mon bébé, ma grand-mere and mon grand-père. Their family portrait activity indicated good comprehension of basic vocabulary taught in class. Bravo!

### Grade 3

This first term, the grade three class has shown a keen interest in learning the French language. Students are increasing their ability to follow directions given in French and speak simple words and phrases during our calendar routine. During our unit on "Les Saisons," students were able to identify and label each season and match them accordingly to the corresponding weather in French. Currently, students have been taking part in a variety of language-based activities; les sondages, lotto, and memoire, all relating to our class story *Les animaux du zoo*. Keep up the fabulous work!

### Grade 4

Throughout the first term, the grade four students have exhibited a genuine interest in French class. They are able to recognize and read simple words related to our classroom calendar while *Les miniprofs* direct the class through our calendar routine. During our unit "L' école", students were asked to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of newly taught vocabulary through their writeups. The class was able to correctly identify and name different rooms within a school, as well as different objects found within those rooms. Super work!

### Grade 5

The first term the grade 5 students continue to make steady progress during French class. They are able to recognize, read, and respond in written form to simple questions related to our classroom calendar. In writing, students are increasing in their ability to revisit past texts to assist in further understanding present material. The class continues to work at properly using a French/English dictionary in search of French words and definitions, as well as deciphering appropriate gender before a word (le, la, les). Students are beginning to show a good understanding of the oral language and make a better effort to express themselves using simple vocabulary taught in class. Currently, students are working at utilizing prepositions in their sentence structures related to their art project on "La Maison".

### Grade 6

During the first term, the grade six class has made a good effort in applying themselves during class time. They continue to build a strong sight word vocabulary and develop good comprehension skills through our *Message du Jour* journal entries. Students are increasing in their ability to decipher text independently and accurately respond using proper spelling and sentence structure. The class is working at showcasing their knowledge and ability to create proper sentence structures using the verbs "faire and jouer" through their detailed and well-organized Prezi presentations. Great work this term!

### Grade 7

This term, the grade seven class focused on the introduction of regular "er" verbs and their proper conjugation forms. Students were asked to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of "er" conjugations through their Halloween Art activity. Presently, the class is beginning to work with the text "Habiller Dans le Noir". Students will be working at properly sequencing the story in French, filling in missing information, properly conjugating "er" verbs within the text, and creating their own silly version of the story utilizing proper vocabulary, spelling and sentence structures. Bon travail!

# **Grade 8**

This term, the grade eight class has shown some progress in reading and writing taught vocabulary through their cahier entries. The beginning of term, students focused on a piece of text that they had read and re-read to help improve comprehension and fluency. Using the story, the class was able to fill in the blanks using proper vocabulary and "er" conjugated forms creating their own version of the "Frankenstein" story, corresponding to their pictures created using collage imagery. Presently, the grade 8 class is reviewing regular er verbs. Next reviewing re, & ir French verbs, as well as, working at identifying and utilizing the conjugated forms of Aller, Faire, Avoir & Être.



# School Board News Cont'd

# Financial Report for the year ended June 30, 2022

For 2021/2022 enrollment stayed stable from 2020/2021 levels.

Academic revenue decreased due to the prior year having more safe school funding for COVID support, offset in part by inflationary increases in government grants.

Other revenue increased because of Before and After, Alternate Kindergarten & Nursery program returning to pre-COVID usage.

Prior year's expenses were lower due to Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS) reducing salary costs. This was partially offset by increased wages, higher insurance costs and higher snow removal costs in 2021/2022.

In 2021/2022 \$81,900 was spent on capital purchases which included starting the roofing project and a new phone system.
