From The Principal

Hello Neighbour!

Although the spring season officially begins this week, Winnipeggers have a more pragmatic view of spring: we need the snow to go in order to declare an end to winter, and even then we are not entirely convinced, having been fooled before by April blizzards. As the snow begins to melt, we start to look for the harbingers of spring, from pussy willows to robins to pre-season baseball. Although I take heart at the natural signs of the impending season, one of the main indicators of spring for me is the re-emergence of neighbours.

All winter long we shuttle between our vehicles and houses with as much speed as possible. If by chance we see the people who live around us through our scarves, toques and parkas, we acknowledge them with a curt nod or quick hello. Once the frigid weather passes and we are able to move around the yard again, we find the time to catch up, chatting over the fence or meeting people as they walk their dogs. A feeling of community and connection flourishes along with the crocuses. It is almost like a spiritual thaw takes place alongside the physical one, and it allows us to extend ourselves out to our physical neighbours and to the world beyond.

This spring phenomenon reminds me of the parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke's Gospel. A person who had training in the law asks Jesus how he can achieve eternal life. Jesus, sensing that the man already knows the answer, asks him what the law says. The answer comes, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength and with all your mind, and love your neighbour as you love yourself." The man pushes further, asking Jesus, "Who is my neighbour?" Jesus' answer comes in the form of the famous parable of the man hurt on the roadside. Many people pass by, but no one comes to his aid, except for the proverbial Samaritan. It is important to note that the Jewish people of the time did not regard Samaritans as friends. In normal circumstances Jews and Samaritans would not have spoken to each other; in extraordinary circumstances, the person that the injured man would have despised saves his life.



In his parable, Jesus chooses to have the injured Jew rescued by a Samaritan to illustrate his point more clearly. It is our actions, rather than our proximity or similarity to others that make us "neighbours". The global nature of our society and lightening speed of media allows us instant access to the suffering of people from Libya, Haiti, Japan, and Afghanistan. These international neighbours need our support along with our neighbours at the Main Street Project and the senior whose snow you shovel. It is our compassion, caring and kindness that makes us neighbours with the people on our street, in our city and country and around the world. It's not always easy being a good neighbour in our world, but we all know how right it feels and how thankful we are when someone is a good neighbour to us!

As the coming season of spring warms the earth and brings it to life again, may the message of this parable enlighten us on our Lenten journey and enliven us to live as true neighbours in our communities and in our world.




February

Physical Education Second Term 2022-23

Kindergarten Grade 1 and 2

During the second term, early years students were involved in a variety of activities to practice and develop some of the fourteen basic movement skills. In particular, we worked on manipulation skills including catching, throwing and striking. We played different lead up games that incorporated all of the basic movement skills. We continued to use a variety of equipment and played an assortment of cooperative and low organized games. Safety and fair play have continued to be a focus.

Grades 3-5

In the second term students have participated in a range of different activities including: striking games, basketball and badminton lead-up games and low organized games. The skills we have focused on developing this term include striking skills (kicking a ball, using a racquet, hitting a ball etc.) and movement skills (moving with a bouncing ball, dribbling a soccer ball etc.). An emphasis on fair and safe play is incorporated in all of our activities.

Grades 6-8

During the second term the older students were engaged in an assortment of activities to develop their skills including basketball and badminton. We have focused on developing manipulation skills such as dribbling, passing, shooting and striking a badminton shuttle. Students have continued to work on their personal fitness goals. The concept of team play was developed through basketball and large group team games, while badminton offers students the opportunity to participate in an individual sport.

Français

Joyeux Printemps! Another fabulous term in French has come and gone, take a look at what we've been up to...

Première année

This term, the grade one class continues to be an attentive group, enthusiastic about learning French. Students demonstrate active listening and viewing skills that help to improve comprehension. The class really enjoys taking part in singing or reciting poems related to our classroom themes. In our recent exploration of "les forms," the class actively participated in learning-based activities such as lotto, classroom scavenger hunts & memoire. Students continue to work at demonstrating their knowledge by being able to independently name, identify and label the different types of shapes in French. The class has enjoyed the process of creating their own shape art including les cercles, les rectangles, les carrés, les ovales, les étoiles, and les triangles. Great job!

Deuxième année

Throughout the second term, the grade two class continues to exhibit a love for learning French. Each class time, students partake in songs, poems, and chants to help reinforce vocabulary and comprehension. Throughout our unit "Les moyens du transport", the class worked at being able to name, identify and label the different types of transportation found in the air, on land, and on the water (dans l'air, sur terre, sur l'eau). Students are currently working at demonstrating their knowledge of transportation through the completion of their flipbooks. Good effort! In term three, students will continue to build on vocabulary, oral skills, and strengthen their understanding through language-based games and written activities.



Troisième année

In the second term, the grade three class has shown an excitement and a willingness to want to learn French. In writing, the class is able to recognize "les mots famille" and familiar vocabulary related to our classroom calendar. With assistance, students are able to utilize the taught vocabulary in their written work. In our study on body parts, the class enjoyed creating their Name Monsters and were able to successfully use the form of avoir "I have..." to describe various physical features of their monsters. They continue, as a group, to make more

attempts to speak French when asking to go to the bathroom or get a drink of water. Fabulous work!

Quatrième année

This term, the grade four class continues to show an eagerness for learning the French language. Students thoroughly enjoy participating in "Mini prof," where each student has the opportunity to direct the class through our calendar routine in French. During our unit "les vêtements" and "les parties du corps," students were able to name and label different types of clothing and body parts. The class was able to demonstrate their understanding of taught vocabulary and "Il porte_____" phrasing through their Silly Sentences Posters. Awesome job!



Cinquième année

The grade five students continue to be eager and active participants during French class.

In reading, the class is increasing in their ability to independently recognize and read common French words related to our classroom calendar, as well as, studied vocabulary from previous themes. With assistance, good use of words and phrases of taught vocabulary in their written work. To end our unit on "Les Points Cardinaux", the class was asked to create a map. Students were able to independently create their legends, label the map accordingly and create sentences describing the proper coordinates correctly in French.





Sixième année

In the second term, the grade six class has shown steady progress in the French program. Students continue to work on their reading and writing abilities through our "Message du Jour." The class is now able to read and use phrases appropriately to formulate simple sentences. Currently, the grade six class is enjoying our unit "Les Pays." To date, students are becoming more proficient in decoding texts by recognizing high frequency words and familiar vocabulary. In turn, students have begun applying these words and phrases in their written work. Fabulous effort on your French speaking Country projects!

Septième année

Throughout the second term, the grade 7 class has made good effort in partaking in all classroom language-based activities. In writing, the class was able to showcase their knowledge and ability to properly conjugate ER, RE & IR verbs, as well as use them correctly in simple sentences in their cahier entries and in-class assignments. In turn, students have been able to recognize and decode words when reading simple sentences. Students are currently working on rough drafting a game board that uses the proper conjugation forms for er, re & ir verbs in the present tense. Can't wait to see the final products!

Huitième année

The grade 8 students continue to show progress working towards the French curricular outcomes. Overall, the group shows an interest in learning the French language and actively takes part in all class activities. Students continue to make a good effort speaking French in large group and small group discussions. Throughout the second term, students have been focusing on the proper structure of Passé Composé with Être. The group continues to work on demonstrating their knowledge and ability to correctly create the passé composé utilizing the appropriate auxiliary verb, its pronoun, and the proper use of the past participle. Students are currently working on writing storyboards utilizing the passé composé for their Stop Motion Movies. Bien fait!



Festival du Voyageur

Our school has taken part in yet another successful "Festival Week". This year, every grade participated in an individually curated activity centered around different aspects of the French, Metis, and Indigenous culture. These activities included; cuisine, traditions, art, music, games and more. It was a week filled with fun, laughter, intrigue, and excitement. Students in grades 5 to 8 found baking bannock over an open fire to be more challenging than expected... but very tasty! While students in grades K to 4 were given an opportunity to try some great tasting Bannock within their classrooms. A huge thank you to Mrs. Davison for the delicious soup aux pois... always a fan favourite! Another thank you to my lovely grade 6 group who took on the responsibility of running our gym stations. Because of all your hardwork the "Festival Games" were thoroughly enjoyed by all students from Nursery to grade 4.

From the Music Room

The Music Room continues to be a busy place as unique and united students learn and grow together, strive for excellence always (in all ways), and have fun!

Overview

Despite its title, our Christmas performance, "A Christmas Carol Catastrophe" was a success, thanks to the talents of the Kindergarten to Grade Six students, along with the entire staff. It was such a pleasure to finally perform before a live audience to experience the laughter, surprise and delight (and of course, singing along to the pa-rum-pa-pum-pums) together again.

Our students also shared their talents with the St. Alphonsus Parish community, with a Grade Three through Six

Choir leading the hymns and assuming cantor responsibilities, during our Catholic Schools' Week Sunday Mass. Our monthly school Masses were enhanced by a Junior High Choir and Grade Three to Six Choirs. This term, we explored Chinese music and dance during the Lunar New Year. Our version of a Fan Dance was one highlight. During Festival Week students learned about the music and some teachings of the Metis people through the story, "Andrea's Fiddle". To recognize African Heritage Month, we sang code songs, said to have helped people fleeing slavery to navigate their journey; and heard the stories and music of people with African heritage. The Kindergarten Class is continuing to explore basic musical concepts. Playing singing-based and instrumental games, which require purposeful listening, develops individual voices and promotes ensemble skills. Students have been joyfully demonstrating their musicianship this term. Maintaining a steady beat and using musical vocabulary will continue to be emphasized.

tunes of Ireland, as well as learning about some traditional Irish instruments.

Grades 1-3

This term students have been developing their musical skills in a variety of formats. Performing and composing as individuals, and in small groups, demonstrates creative and collaborative skills. Singing and playing instruments as a whole class requires purposeful listening and close attention to the conductor's cues. Students use created forms of notation and basic standard notation to express their musical ideas when composing.

Grades 4-6

These classes are working at relating the symbols and structure of standard music notation to how the notes sound when they sing and play. Creating and performing compositions according to set criteria demonstrates their understanding of musical concepts and collaborative skills. Chords and chord progressions are studied and practiced providing a foundation for making music in a variety contexts. Discussions about the role of music in culture and society are lively and show the students' insight and interest in making wider connections to musical topics.

Grades 7 and 8

The Junior High music students use a variety of instruments to support music theory concepts studied. These activities help students to develop their musical skills working as an ensemble and individually. They demonstrate autonomy when selecting instruments (or devices) and songs to share their musical skills. This term, small groups and individuals created and presented music using in a wide range of forms including a traditional trio (violin, cello and piano), a vocal group, piano duets, a video game and other computer-generated music-making programs. All of the Junior High students have provided input into the preliminary stage of producing our annual Spring Theatre performance, which we are looking forward to bringing to the stage, one night (and afternoon) only, on Thursday May 25, 2023!




