# From The Principal

There is an air of excitement around the school in the weeks leading up to summer holidays; staff and students are in high spirits and ready to spend some time relaxing, myself included. The rhythm of summer holidays has been part of my groove for a very long time, first as a student, then as a teacher and parent, and now as an administrator. Anyone who works in schools is blessed to have this block of vacation, but we aren't the only ones who treasure this time.

A few years ago there was some buzz in the educational community regarding year round schooling. The proponents of this initiative believe that students attending classes through the summer would have greater retention of information, therefore learning would increase. The idea never really caught on in North America. # **Annual Community Report 2023-2024**

Each school in the province must provide an annual school report for the community. The purpose of the report is to share some school profile information, report on various steps taken to meet school improvement goals and to outline other action plans underway in the school. Please take some time to review this report. Should you have any questions or comments regarding any information therein, or if you would like to have input regarding plans for the coming year, please contact the principal or one of the School Board members. You are also welcome to share your ideas at the PALS meeting on Tuesday, September 10th or the School Board Meeting on Wednesday, September 11th. Your ideas are welcome and play an important role in shaping the school's direction and future.

#### **School Profile**

St. Alphonsus School is a K-8 Catholic School. This year, the student population was 235, and the staff consisted of fourteen certified teachers, seven educational assistants, an office manager, a financial administrator, a building manager and a custodian. Additionally, we have a nursery program providing academic and social learning to 35 preschool aged children. As well as providing the provincial core curriculum, the school offers religious instruction, basic French instruction (grade 1-8) and resource support.

#### School Plan 2023-24

One of the tasks of the school administration is to develop a plan in consultation with the various members of the community, including staff, students and parents. Many of the initiatives pursued by schools require a long term approach for implementation. As a result, most school plans encompass more than one school year. This practice has been the case in our school. After priorities were identified, strategies were developed in alignment with our goals. The plan was formalized and put into effect. Our staff has found that choosing one of the goals as our primary focus for each of the years of the school plan allows us to move more deeply into the goal. .

#### **Goal 1** - Numeracy Education

#### Numeracy Education: To deepen students understanding of numerical concepts.

Our second priority was Numeracy Education. We began our work on this priority by identifying areas of strength as well as challenges in our students understanding of math concepts at all grade levels. Teachers met in Grade band groups to discuss strategies to address areas that needed strengthening. Although we made some progress in this priority area, we will refocus on Numeracy Education in the coming school year.

#### **Goal 2 Strategic Priorities**

Flowing out of last spring's strategic planning sessions, there were a number of initiatives that we undertook this year. A committee comprised of board staff and parents revisited the school's mission and vision statements. A second sub-committee took on the task of developing a graduate profile. The fruits of these labours are included in the following pages for you. Addidtionally, we conducted a n in depth assessment of the school building so that we can proactively plan for the long term having a sense of the lifespans of our systems. Our school staff have begun conversations around our school spaces and how best to use them., including the art room, thr science lab and the computer lab. We will continue with these conversations in the coming year.

#### **Ongoing Priorities**

The Staff continued to work on our most recent priority areas including **Sustainability and Indigenous Education.** Although these were not officially on our plan, we wanted to capitalize on the gains made in these areas and use this momentum to continue work in these areas. All teachers attending their second day of

Treaty Education Training, which brings us into compliance with the provincial mandate for this training. We look forward to having the remaining members of our support staff complete this interesting and important training in the new school year.

#### **In Summary**

This has been a busy, successful year at the school, with much growth and change. We are working towards our priorities while remaining responsive to the emerging needs of the students and the community. Thank you to all members of the community-students, staff and parents—for your ongoing support of the school. Together we make St. Alphonsus School a great place to be.



#### Kindergarten, Grades 1, 2 and 3

Hello everybody, Miss Millet here! The year is almost over, and what a fun year we had! A big bravo to our Grade 8 and 7 students for working together to put on an "out of this world" performance for Spring Theatre! Thank you to Mrs. Rayner and Mr. Klassen, students, and staff members for lending your time, talents, and efforts towards this successful production. Here is a recap of some of the activities in the music room this last term:

#### April:

Coming back from Spring Break, we also celebrated the Resurrection of our Lord, and all students learned several Easter songs in preparation for our school mass. We also held Easter egg hunts where students had to exercise their knowledge of note values. Grade K-3 revisited musical terms like beat, tempo, and dynamics, with a spring theme. Grade 4 started their Recorder Karate unit, where they earn different belts to hang on their recorder after learning and performing increasingly difficult songs. Our Grade 5 and 6s had a brief guitar unit where they learned to fingerpick a few songs as well as several chords. During this month, our Grade 7 and 8 students worked tirelessly to memorize lines, sing solos, learn musical accompaniment, and create props for Spring Theatre.

#### May:

Manitoba declared May as Music month, so our grade 5 and 6 students shared their musical preferences with each other, which is a very brave thing to do at their age! ## **French**

This term all classes took part in a variety of games, activities, and literary based exercises associated with thematic units studied during class time. It is wonderful to see how students have grown throughout the course of the year both personally and academically. Each group has developed a level of self-esteem, self- confidence, and critical thinking. These positive attributes help to encourage goal setting and pave the way for positive future experiences.

### **French Across the Grades**

- Grade 1- The grade 1 class has remained an enthusiastic group who enjoy participating in all French language-based activities such as, chants, poems, lotto, and dance counting to 20. The beginning of the third term, students began studying "La chenille qui fait des trous," (The Hungry Caterpillar). Throughout the unit, the class studied vocabulary related to fruits, colours, days of the week, and numbers. Students were able to independently complete sequencing, sorting, and matching French activities related to our thematic unit. Great work everyone! Have a wonderful summer holiday!
- Grade 2- The grade 2 class continues to be a lively bunch who shows great interest in learning French. Students haven been working towards recognizing common phrases in French "J'aime" and "Je n'aime pas", to help them describe their likes and dislikes of each month. The class really enjoyed taking part in our Farm Animal unit. Students were able to demonstrate their knowledge by independently naming and identifying different types of farm animals and their habitats in French. The grade 2 class did a fabulous job creating their Les *Animaux de la Ferme* flipbooks. Have fabulous summer and see you in the fall!
- Grade 3- The grade 3 class continued to work on responding to questions orally and in written form relating to the classroom calendar: numbers, weather, seasons, months, and days of the week. Beginning this term, the class began their investigation of Feelings and Emotions, learning how to express themselves using proper phrasing of; fâche, triste, heureux, peur, désolé, and fatigue.

During our unit on "La Maison", the class was able to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of vocabulary associated with the different rooms in a house through the completion of their Oragami House. Such a fantastic group. Thank you for a great year! Have a safe and happy summer!

- Grade 4- This term, the grade 4 class continued to be an eager group who actively participated in all French activities. Students took part in a variety of language-based activities relating to our thematic unit "La Pizza." These activities such as bingo, class surveys, and puzzles, provided students an opportunity to work on proper pronunciation and phrasing when speaking French. Great job creating your own pizza recipes! Currently, the class is exploring dictionary skills while immersed in our book study "Benjamin et la nuit". Enjoy a safe and happy summer!
- Grade 5- This term, the grade 5 class enjoyed beginning each French period with an oral game "J'ai..., Qui a...?" A language-based activity to help them recall numbers to 100, improve pronunciation, and gain self-confidence when speaking French. Students took an interest in our thematic unit "Les Super-héros." The class was able to demonstrate their use of dictionary skills, as well as their knowledge and understanding of select adjectives and verbs through their completion of their comic strips. Presently, students are finishing activities associated with our book study "Le Zloukch". Fabulous work grade 5's. Can't wait to see you back in the fall. Have a great summer break!
- Grade 6- Throughout this term, the grade 6 group continued to put forth their best efforts and showed a keen interest in all French activities. The class thoroughly enjoyed taking part in our Question & Answer period. This provided them opportunity to recognize commonly asked questions in French, practice responding to questions authentically, and use proper pronunciation. This activity lent itself well to the study of Avoir & Être, that students began to use in their written work "Étoile de la semaine." Great work and I look forward to seeing you all in the fall!
- Grade 7- The grade 7 group began the third term reviewing the grammatical concepts associated with ER, RE, & IR verb conjugations through the implementation of their Gameboards. What a blast, it was so much fun! During our unit on French Possessive Adjectives students were able to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding through the completion of their flipbooks, highlighting the differences between each adjective and when to properly use the masculine, feminine, or plural form. Presently, the grade 7 group is learning how to recognize and implement the proper form of "French Negation". Lots of fantastic work, bien fait! Have a safe summer vacation!
- Grade 8- This term, the grade eight class continues to work at making a good effort applying themselves during French class. Beginning of term, students worked at understanding the difference between futur proche vs. futur simple. Focusing on future simple, the class was able to familiarize themselves with the proper conjugation forms and independently create sentences associated with their *Famous Photo Recreations*. During our unit on Reflexive verbs, the class learned how to determine the difference between reflexive vs. non reflexive verbs (me, te, se, nous, vous, se). Students demonstrated their knowledge and ability to properly conjugate reflexive verbs in their Prezi presentations "Ma Routine Quotidienne". I wish you all the best in grade nine. May you all enjoy a safe and relaxing summer!

Here is a delicious recipe that you can make all summer long!

#### 5-INGREDIENT STRAWBERRY SALSA

**PREP TIME: 10 MINUTES** 

**TOTAL TIME: 10 MINUTES** 

YIELD: 4 -6 SERVINGS

#### DESCRIPTION

This 5-Ingredient Strawberry Salsa is sweet, simple to make, and so delicious!

#### **INGREDIENTS**

1 pint strawberries, hulled and finely diced

1 jalapeno, stem and seeds removed, finely diced (when you remove the seeds...it is not very spicy at all! The seeds hold the spice, so if you want it spicy, leave the seeds in!)

half of a small red onion, peeled and finely diced (about 1/2 cup)

2/3 cup finely chopped fresh cilantro, loosely-packed (if you are not a cilantro fan, substitute with flat leaf parsley)

juice of 1 lime, about 2 tablespoons (pinch of salt and black pepper)

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Toss all ingredients together until combined. Season with extra salt and pepper, if needed.
\*If you would like a sweeter salsa, feel free to stir in a few teaspoons of honey, maple syrup, agave nectar or sugar.
