School Plan 2025-26

One of the tasks of the school administration is to develop a plan in consultation with the various members of the community, including staff, students and parents. Many of the initiatives pursued by schools require a long-term approach for implementation. As a result, most school plans encompass more than one school year. This practice has been the case in our school; these goals will continue forward into subsequent school years.

Goal 1-Assessment and Reporting

Assessment and Reporting: To ensure clear, accurate communication in formative and summative assessments

We will select a format for early literacy assessment and begin its implementation over the course of this school year.

Teachers will explore the use of assessment in formative practice, allowing targeted intervention for students with specific learning needs.

Conversations around summative assessment and communication to parents will be a priority over the school year.

Teachers will meet in grade bands to share challenges and strengths in assessment and reporting, as well as to increase consistency across the grade levels.

• Teachers will attend professional development in this area, both on MTS PD Day and during the year as opportunities arise.

Teachers will implement best practice in assessment, as determined through research.

Goal 2- Global Competencies

Global Competencies: Understanding and implementing the global competencies identified by Manitoba Education and Early childhood Learning

• All classroom teachers will attend professional development over the course of the year.

Staff will use meeting time to discuss their implementation of the global competencies, sharing success and challenges.

Ongoing Priorities

The Staff will continue to work on our most recent priority areas including Numeracy Education, Supporting Student Mental Health, Technology, Sustainability and Indigenous Education.

Although these are not officially on our plan, we want to capitalize on the gains made in these areas and use this momentum to continue work in these areas.

Music Term 1 2025-2026

Hello everyone, Miss Millet here! I'm so happy for another year of music-making at St. Als! I can't believe we're wrapping up Term 1 already, so here is a quick snapshot of life in the music room:

September: We began the school year by reminding each class that music is for returning and new students, and everyone in our community. In recognition of truth and reconciliation, we explored different styles of singing, instruments, and dance found across Turtle Island. We also revisited key musical skills such as beat, rhythm, tempo, and reading the music staff to build a solid base for the year ahead.

October: October was full of excitement for our Grade 3–6 students as they explored new instruments! Grade 3s practiced attentive listening while playing together as a percussion ensemble. Grade 4s learned how to care for and play their recorders responsibly. Grade 5 tried their hand at the ukulele, and Grade 6 picked up the guitar once again. Meanwhile, our younger learners have done a wonderful job strengthening their voices with singing activities and games.

November: We reflected on our theme of peace, and focused on developing strong, expressive singing voices through pieces like *Peace Before Us, Peace Behind Us and Peace Is Flowing Like a River.* A special thank you to Alex in Grade 5 for performing the bagpipes during our Remembrance Day ceremony! Afterward, we shifted our attention to Christmas concert preparations. Our many instrumentalists are practicing and perfecting their songs, which are coming along nicely.

Looking Forward to December: Students from Kindergarten to Grade 6 have been hard at work learning songs, choreography, and instrumental parts for our upcoming Christmas Concert on **Thursday, December 18**. Our Grade 6 cast is practicing their lines with expression and will be rehearsing after school to make the performance the best it can be. Costume details will be shared soon!

From the Art Room

Our middle school artists are creating wonderful pieces, which are found on display outside the Art room- please come take a look! Every student carries creativity within them, and through exploring various elements of design and different art materials, I hope each one discovers something that inspires them. Grade 7 has just wrapped up a realism unit, where they practiced drawing different facial features and successfully recreated one half of their own face. They're now moving on to oil pastels with a festive twist! Grade 8 made a striking impact with their eerie charcoal artwork and have recently begun cross-stitch, showing noticeable progress with each class. Let's keep cheering on our young creators as they explore and express their ideas through art! *\.

French First Term 2025

Grade 1 – The grade one class is a lively and enthusiastic group, eager to learn and participate during French lessons. Each class begins with our routine greeting, "Bonjour, comment ça va?", followed by chants of the days of the week, months of the year, and movement breaks that incorporate counting from 1 to 10 in French. During our colour theme, students read the story Les feuilles and participated in literacy games such as 4 Corners, Lotto, and Memory to reinforce colour vocabulary and strengthen repetition and comprehension skills. They also practiced using descriptive words such as petit, moyen, and grand to describe different sizes of leaves. Currently, the grade one class is learning vocabulary related to facial features and is thoroughly enjoying a variety of literacy activities to help enforce their understanding. A wonderful start to the year!

Grade 2 – In French class, grade two students are attentive learners who follow instructions carefully and use visual cues to support their understanding. Each lesson includes a balance of songs, games, and language-focused activities that help strengthen their vocabulary and oral language skills. During our unit on family, students practiced recognizing and naming family members (la maman, le papa, la sœur, le frère, le bébé, la grand-mère, le grand-père) and began creating family portraits that reflect their new vocabulary. Students are now practicing reading and identifying colours in French through our read-aloud *Pat* e *Chat : J'adore mes souliers blancs, and they are working on creating their own versions of the story. Excellent work, grade two!*

Grade 3 – The grade three class began the term by reviewing key calendar vocabulary, including days of the week, months, and seasons. Students participated in a variety of literacy activities connected to our weather theme to strengthen their vocabulary and comprehension. By the end of the unit, they were able to describe different types of weather across the seasons. The class is now enjoying our book study, *Les Animaux du Zoo*, *where they are practicing recognizing, identifying, and labeling different animals and their corresponding colours*.

Grade 4 – The grade four class is an enthusiastic group with a strong interest in learning French. They particularly enjoy participating in *Mini prof*, where each student takes a turn leading our calendar question-and-answer routine. Recently, students have been learning new vocabulary related to our unit L'École. They demonstrated their understanding by creating "Sac à Dos" mini -posters and further applied their knowledge by independently writing descriptive sentences about where objects are located within a school setting. A fantastic start—keep up the excellent work!

Grade 5 – Throughout the first term, the grade five class has been practicing calendar routines, recognizing written numbers in French, and using the phrasing "Aujourd'hui…, Hier était…, Demain sera…" to describe the date. We began the year by strengthening dictionary skills to support spelling, reading comprehension, and independence in writing. Students have also focused on using French prepositions in their written work. Currently, they are applying their understanding of prepositions and La Maison vocabulary to write complete sentences describing their magazine-style art projects. Excellent effort this term!

Grade 6 – In French, the grade six class begins each session with Message du jour, an important balanced-literacy routine that supports thematic study, spelling accuracy, phrasing, and reading fluency. Students demonstrated their understanding of expressions such as j'aime, j'adore,

je n'aime pas, and je déteste through sentence writing connected to their puzzle-piece art. They are now expanding their skills by incorporating these phrases into their Jouer vs Faire Prezi project, highlighting the difference between the verbs, as well as the rules associated with the use of the verb when a sport is masculine versus feminine. Fantastic job!

Grade 7 – This term, the grade seven class focused on learning regular *-er verb conjugations and applying them accurately in context. Students demonstrated their understanding through a Halloween-themed art activity featuring their own original sentences. In our upcoming clothing unit, students will work with the text Habiller dans le noir, concentrating on reading, decoding, sequencing, and editing the story using correct <i>-er verb forms and clothing vocabulary. Students are presently concluding the unit by creating their own silly version of the story, properly utilizing the masculine, feminine, and plural forms of clothing, body parts, and colours in their written work. Bien fait!*

Grade 8 – The grade eight class has shown steady progress in using modelled vocabulary and phrases and in following simple French instructions. Students have applied learned vocabulary in their writing and during peer Q&A interactions. The grade 8 class began the year learning how to properly identify and conjugate both irregular verbs Avoir & Etre. Students were able to showcase their ability to accurately use the verbs in written form through the completion of their celebrity "Qui suis-je?". During our unit on regular -er verbs, students engaged in repeated-reading strategies to build comprehension and fluency, and they practiced sequencing the text, filling in missing information, and editing for correct verb use. They are now reviewing the conjugation patterns for regular -re and -ir verbs in preparation for their upcoming project. A strong start to the year!

Bonjour à tous!

Throughout the first term, each class has been actively participating in various language based activities & games such as, Lotto, Bazinga, Buzz, Q & A's, Brain Teasers, all which have been connected to curricular outcomes within our thematic units.

My goal in French is to help students develop their knowledge of French vocabulary, increase positive attitudes, & my main focus on enhancing communication skills. In turn, students will become better writers in French; 'if they can say it, then they can write it'.



I am thrilled by the overall participation and enthusiasm each class exhibits and look forward to starting a new and exciting next term!

Physical Education Across the Grades

Kindergarten—Grade 2

This term the early years students were involved in activities to practice and develop some of the fourteen basic movement skills. In particular, we worked on galloping, running and skipping. As well, we learned to use different equipment and played a variety of cooperative and low organized games. We discussed and practiced the rules and routines we use to play safely and fairly in the gym.

Grades 3-5

During the first term the grade three to five students were involved in the following activities: various sport lead up games, fitness challenges and low organized games. The skills we have focused on developing this term include manipulation skills: passing throwing and catching. We have also worked on the movement skills of running and moving in the gym through our various games and activities. We have also worked on fair play concepts and what that looks like in the gym.

Grade 6-8

Students in grades six—eight were involved in the following activities: volleyball, fitness challenges and low organized games. We have focused on developing manipulation skills such as overhead and underhand passing and serving. Our fitness challenges have helped the students to identify some goals to work on during the year to improve their overall fitness.

The fall has been a very busy time in the gym. All the classes are settled into our routines and are enjoying being physically active.

The primary classes have been working on moving safely in the gym. We have been playing cooperative games and are developing a sense of fair play. We are learning to use a variety of equipment and have been concentrating on throwing and catching activities. Our elementary friends have been playing volleyball lead-up games, participating in fitness challenges and enjoying a variety of low organized games. Our older students have been playing volleyball, working to assess and improve their fitness level and participating in different games and activities.

Our annual Terry Fox Family Walk was held on Thursday, September 11th. It was a great day and everyone enjoyed the pizza after the walk was finished. Thank you to everyone who participated and a special thanks to those who donated to this worthy cause.

Volleyball season just finished up. We had five teams on the go (three boys teams and two girls teams) with more than 50 student athletes involved. Through the season the players participated in a number of tournaments (including three hosted at our school) and over 40 league games. Our developmental boys teams concluded their season with a tournament on November 13th, with the boys wrapping things up on Friday, November 14th. Both teams had a remarkable season. wonderful way to connect with other parents! All attendees are automatically entered into a monthly \$100 tuition draw sponsored by the Board.




Meetings begin at 7:00 PM and usually run for about an hour.

Financial Report for the year ended June 30, 2025

For 2024/2025 enrollment stayed stable from 2023/2024 levels.

Academic revenue increased to inflationary increases in government grants and tuition increases.

Other revenue has stayed stable year over year.

Expenses increased due to primarily due to higher staffing costs as a result of salary increases and higher insurance costs offset with lower spending on repairs & maintenance, textbooks and strategic planning spending.

Capital purchases in 2024/2025 were \$16,000 for the Art / Cooking Room renovations, new server, upgraded security camera and the Seacan storage unit.
